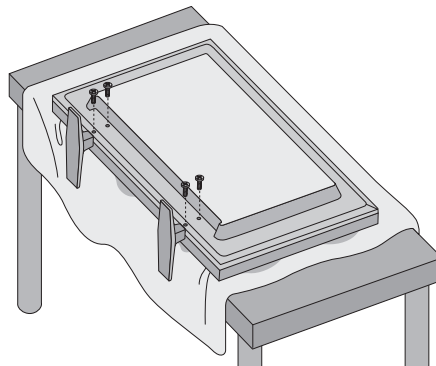

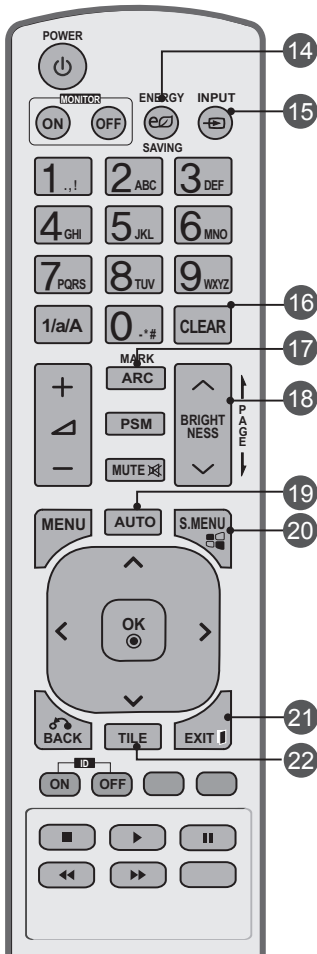
# Using the Remote Control

## ● Name of the Remote Control Buttons



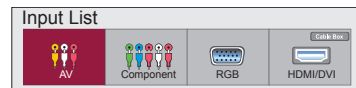
- 1 Power On / Off Button**  
- Switches the set on from standby or off to standby.
- 2 Monitor On / Off Button**  
- Turn off the monitor and then turn it back on.
- 3 Number and Alphabet Buttons**  
- Type numbers.  
- The alphabet selection is not applicable.
- 4 1/a/A Button**  
- This button selection is not applicable.
- 5 Volume Up/Down Button**  
- Adjusts the volume.
- 6 PSM Button**  
- Selects the Picture Status Mode.
- 7 MUTE Button**  
- Switches the sound on or off.
- 8 MENU Button**  
- Selects a menu.  
- Clears all on-screen displays and returns to Set viewing from any menu.
- 9 Up/Down/Left/Right Buttons**  
- Allows you to navigate the on-screen menus and adjust the system settings to your preference.
- 10 OK Button**  
- Accepts your selection or displays the current mode.
- 11 BACK button**  
- Allows the user to move return one step in an interactive application.
- 12 ID ON/OFF Button**  
- When the number of input ID is equal to the number of ID Mode, you can control the monitor which you want in the multi display condition.
- 13 USB Menu control buttons**  
- Adjust the USB menu (Photo List, Music List and Movie List).

# Using the Remote Control



**14 Energy Saving Button**  
- Adjust the Energy Saving mode of the SET.

**15 INPUT Select Button**  
If you press the button once, the following Input Signal Window will appear. Select the signal type you want using the < > button.



**16 Clear button**  
- This button selection is not applicable.

**17 ARC Button**  
- Selects the Aspect Ratio Mode

**18 Brightness Key**  
- Adjust the brightness by pressing the Up and Down buttons on the remote control.  
- In USB mode, the OSD menu has the Page function to move to the next file list.

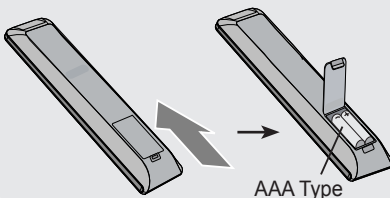
**19 AUTO Button**  
- Automatically adjusts picture position and minimizes image instability.(RGB input only)

**20 S.MENU Button (SuperSign Menu Key)**  
- This button selection is not applicable.

**21 EXIT Button**  
- Clears all on-screen displays and returns to monitor viewing from any menu.

**22 TILE button**  
- Selects the TILE Mode

## Inserting batteries into remote control.

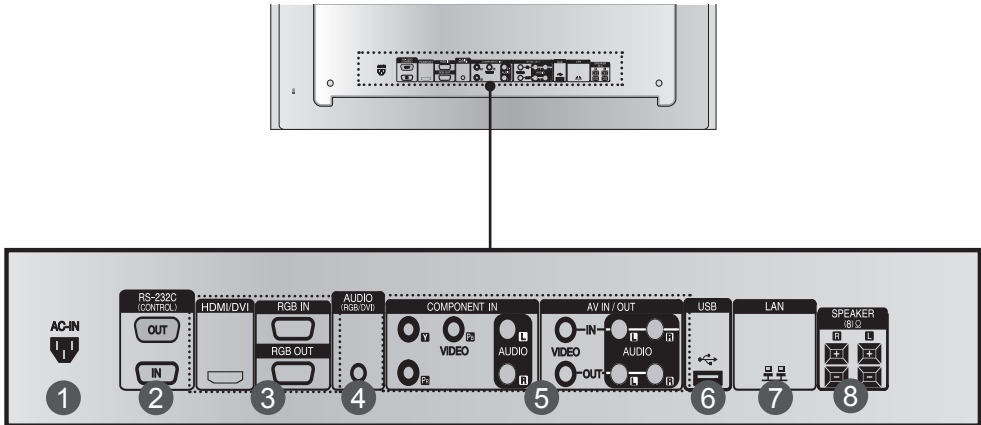


- Slide off the battery cover.
  - Insert the batteries with correct polarity ( + / - ).
  - Close the battery cover.
  - To remove the batteries, perform the installation actions in reverse.
- Dispose of used batteries in the recycle bin to prevent environmental pollution.

# Name and Function of the Parts

\* The product image in the user's guide could be different from the actual image.

## Rear View



- 1 Power Connector**  
Connect the power cord
- 2 RS-232C Serial Ports**
- 3 RGB, HDMI/DVI Ports**  
HDMI Supports High Definition input and HDCP (High-bandwidth Digital Content Protection). Some devices require HDCP in order to display HD signals.
- 4 PC Sound Jack**  
Connect the audio cable to the \*LINE OUT jack of the PC sound card.
- 5 Component, AV Ports**
- 6 USB Port**
- 7 LAN Port**
- 8 Speaker Ports**

### \* LINE OUT

A terminal used to connect to the speaker including a built-in amplifier (Amp). Make sure that the connecting terminal of the PC sound card is checked before connecting. If the Audio Out of PC sound card has only Speaker Out, reduce the PC volume. If the Audio Out of the PC sound card supports both Speaker Out and Line Out, convert to Line Out using the card jumper of the program (Refer to the Sound Card Manual).

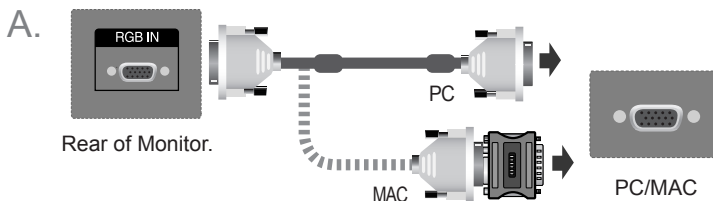

1 First of all, see if the computer, product and the peripherals are turned off. Then, connect the signal input cable.

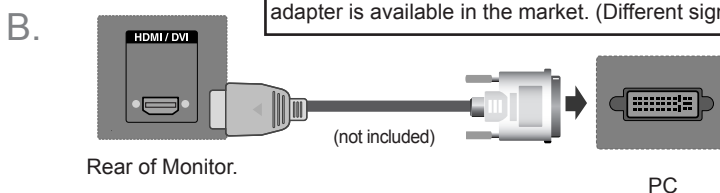
A. When connecting with the D-Sub signal input cable.

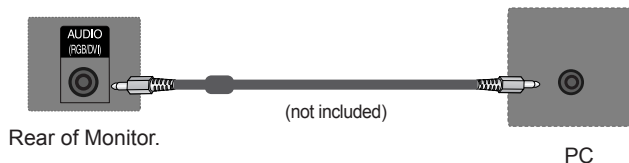


Macintosh Adapter (not included)  
Use the standard Macintosh adapter since an incompatible adapter is available in the market. (Different signaling system)

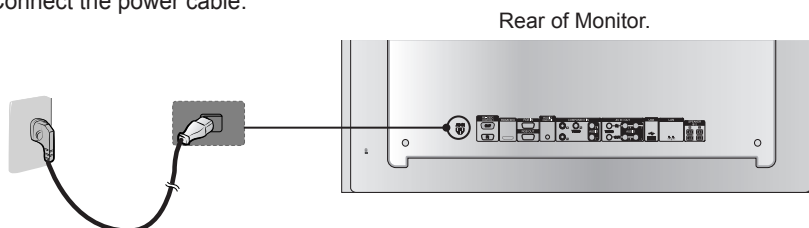


\* User must use shielded signal interface cables (D-sub 15 pin cable, HDMI-DVI cable) with ferrite cores to maintain standard compliance for the product.

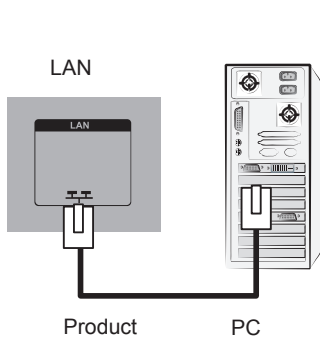
- How to connect to two computers.

- Always use the 3 pin mains lead supplied plugged into a 13 mains socket.

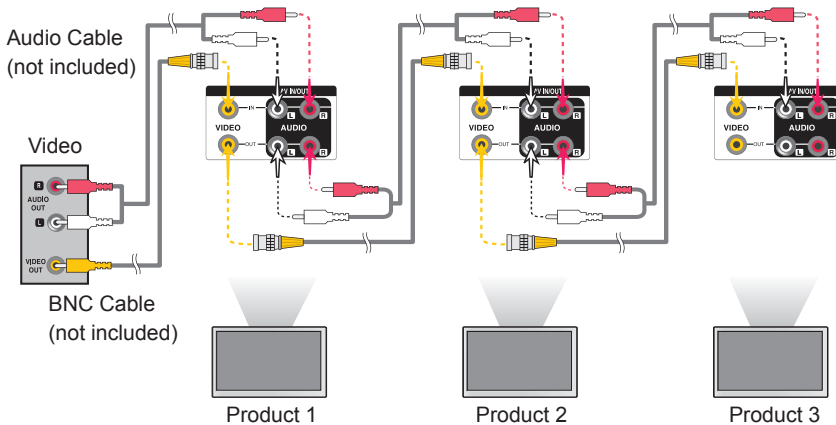
## ● Daisy Chain Monitors

To use different products connected to each other Connect one end of the signal input cable (15-pin D-Sub Signal Cable) to the RGB OUT connector of product 1 and connect the other end to the RGB IN connector of other products.

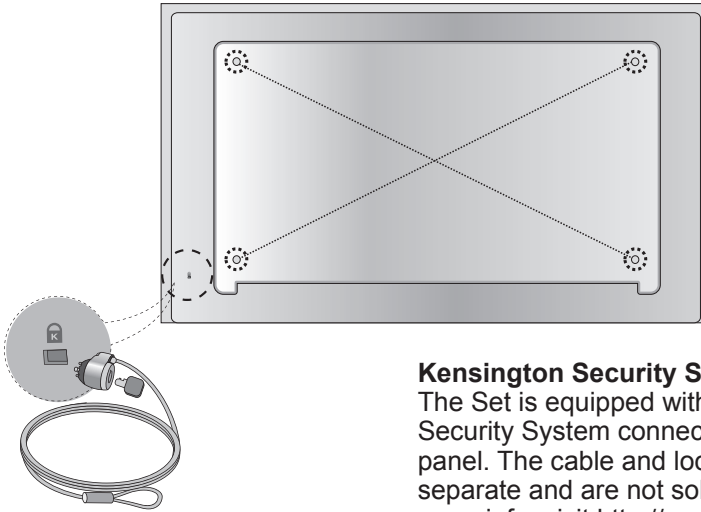
- The number of monitors that can be connected to one output may vary depending on signal status and cable loss. If the signal status is good, and there is no cable loss, it is possible to connect up to 9 monitors. If you want to connect more than this number of monitors, it is recommended to use a distributor.

This product supports a VESA FDMI compliant mounting interface. These mounts are purchased separately and not available from LG. Refer to the instructions included with wall mount for more info.

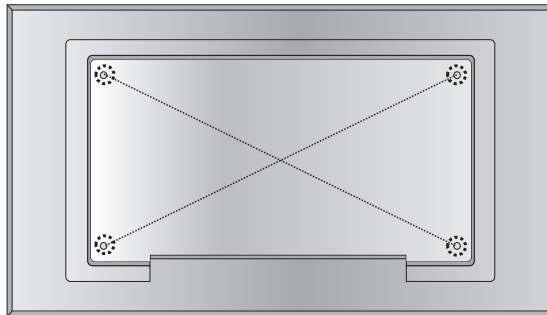

- 2 Power Indicator** This Indicator lights up green when the display operates normally(on mode). If the display is in sleep (Energy Saving) mode, this indicator color changes to amber.
- 3 MENU Button** Use this button to show/hide the OSD (On Screen Display) menu screen.
- 4 OSD Select / Adjust Button** Use this button to select an icon or adjust the setting in the OSD screen.
  - ▲ ▼ Adjust the up and down.
  - ◀ ▶ Adjust the volume.

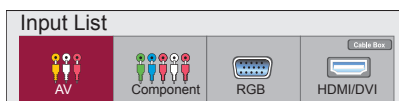



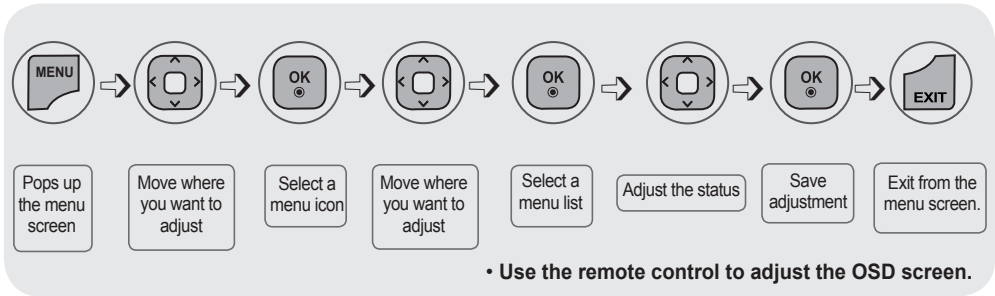

# User Menus

## ● How to adjust the OSD (On Screen Display) screen



1 Press the **MENU** Button, then the main menu of the OSD appears.

2 To access a control, use the  $\wedge \vee$  Buttons.

3 When the icon you want becomes highlighted, press the **OK** Button.

4 To access a control, use the  $\wedge \vee$  Buttons.

5 When the list you want becomes highlighted, press the **OK** Button.

6 Use the  $\wedge \vee < >$  Buttons to adjust the item to the desired level.

7 Accept the changes by pressing the **OK** Button.

8 Exit the OSD by pressing the **EXIT** Button.

## ● How to adjust the screen automatically

Press the **AUTO/SET** button (**AUTO** button on a remote Control) in the PC analog signal. Then optimal screen settings will be selected that fit into the current mode. If adjustment is not satisfactory, you can adjust the screen manually.

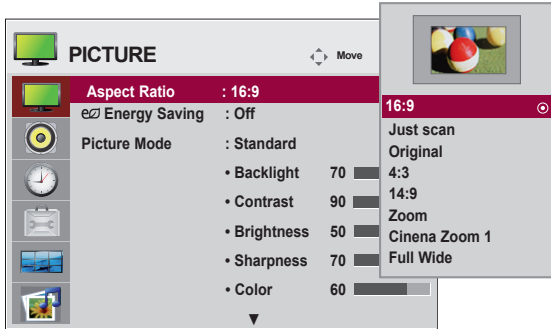

## Adjusting the display image

### Aspect Ratio



To select the image size of the screen.

**16:9** : Widescreen mode.

**Just Scan** : Allows you to enjoy the transmitted data fully without any images cut off.

(\*This menu is activated only in 720p,1080p,1080i (HDMI/DVI-DTV, Component mode)

**Original** : The aspect ratio is not adjusted from the original. It is set by the program being watched.

**4:3** : This picture format is 4:3 aspect ratio.

**1:1** : The aspect ratio is not adjusted from the original. Used in PC mode.

(Only HDMI/ DVI PC, RGB PC)

**14:9** : 14:9 programs are viewed normally in 14:9 with black bars added to the top and bottom.

4:3 programs are magnified on the top/bottom and left/right sides.

**Zoom** : 4:3 programs are magnified until they fill the 16:9 screen. The top and bottom will be cut off.

**Cinena Zoom 1** : Choose Cinema Zoom when you wish the picture to be altered, both horizontally extended and vertically cropped. The picture adopting a compromise between alteration and screen coverage.

**Full Wide** : When Set receives the wide screen signal, it will lead you to adjust the picture horizontally or vertically, in a linear proportion, to fill the entire screen fully.

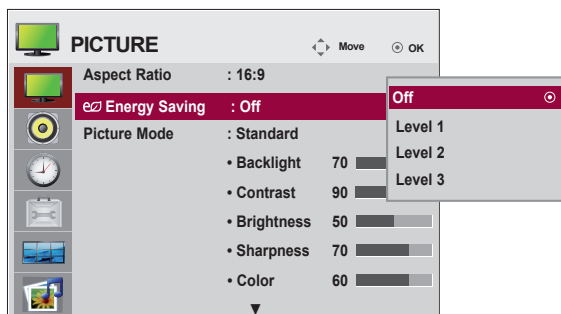

## Adjusting the display image

### Energy Saving



This screen brightness adjusting menu helps you save energy.

**Level :** Total 4 screen brightness levels are provided.

- **Off:** 100% light
- **Level 1:** 80% light
- **Level 2:** 60% light
- **Level 3:** 40% light

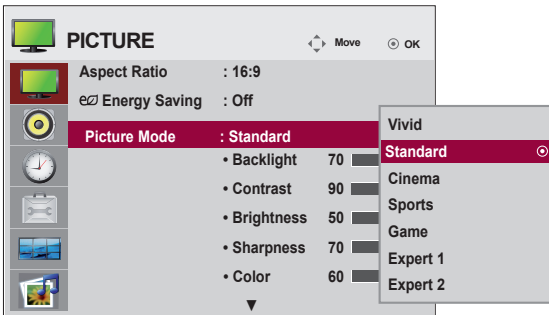


- If the 'Picture Mode' is set to 'Cinema', the 'Energy saving' mode is disabled.

## Adjusting the display image

### Picture Mode



Toggles between screen presets.

**Standard** : The most general and natural screen display status.

**Vivid** : Select this option to display with a sharp image.

**Cinema** : Select this option to lower brightness by one level.

**Sport** : Select this option to display with a soft image.

**Game** : To enjoy dynamic image when playing a game.

**Expert1,2** : Select this option to use the user-defined settings.

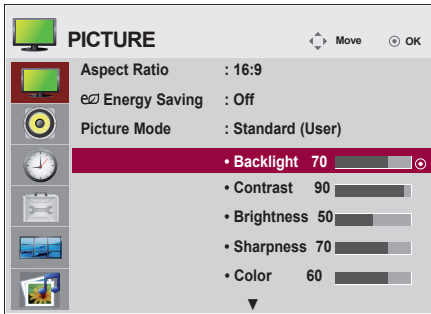
- If the 'Picture Mode' setting in the Picture menu is set to Vivid, Standard, Cinema, Sport or Game the subsequent menus will be automatically set.

### Picture Mode



**Backlight** : To control the brightness of the image, adjust the brightness of LCD panel.

**Contrast** : Adjust the difference between the light and dark levels in the picture.

**Brightness** : To adjust the brightness of the image. (This function can be used only under AV and Component.)

**Sharpness** : To adjust the clearness of the image. (This function can be used only under AV, Component and HDMI/DVI(DTV).)

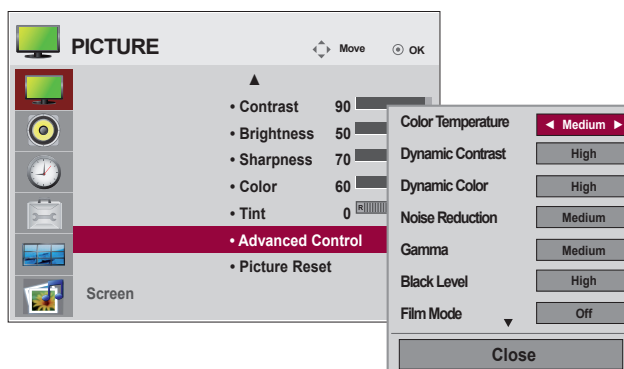
**Color** : To adjust the color to desired level. (This function can be used only under AV, Component and HDMI/DVI(DTV).)

**Tint** : To adjust the tint of the image. (This function can be used only under AV, Component and HDMI/DVI(DTV).)

## Adjusting the display image

### Advanced Control



**Color Temperature** : Color Settings

**Cool** : Slightly purplish white.

**Medium** : Slightly bluish white.

**Warm** : Slightly reddish white.

**Dynamic Contrast** : Optimizes the contrast automatically according to the brightness of the reflection. (This function can be used only under AV, Component and HDMI/DVI(DTV).)

**Dynamic Color** : Adjusts the Color of the reflection automatically to reproduce natural colors as close as possible. (This function can be used only under AV, Component and HDMI/DVI(DTV).)

**Noise Reduction** : Removing the noise up to the point where it does not damage the original picture. (This function can be used only under AV, Component and HDMI/DVI(DTV).)

**Gamma** : Set your own gamma value.

On the monitor, high gamma values display whitish images and low gamma values display high contrast images.

**Black Level** : (Function works in the following mode - AV, Component, HDMI-DTV) adjusts the contrast and the brightness of the screen using the black level of the screen.

**Low** : The reflection of the screen gets darker.

**High** : The reflection of the screen gets brighter.

**Film Mode** : (Function works in the following mode - AV, Component 480i/576i/1080i, HDMI/DTV 480i/576i/1080i) When you watch a movie, this function adjusts the set to the best picture appearance.

**White Balance** : This is the function to adjust the overall colour of the image to the feeling you want. (Function works in the following mode - Expert 1, Expert 2 Picture mode)

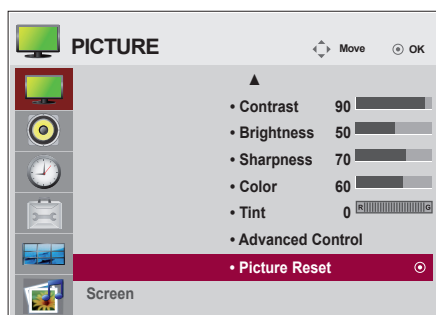
**Color Management System** :

Expert calibration is possible with professional test equipment and will not affect other colours but can be used to selectively adjust the 6 colour areas (Red/Green/Blue/Cyan/Magenta/Yellow). Colour difference may not be distinctive even when you make the adjustments for the general video.(Function works in the following mode - Expert 1, Expert 2 Picture mode)

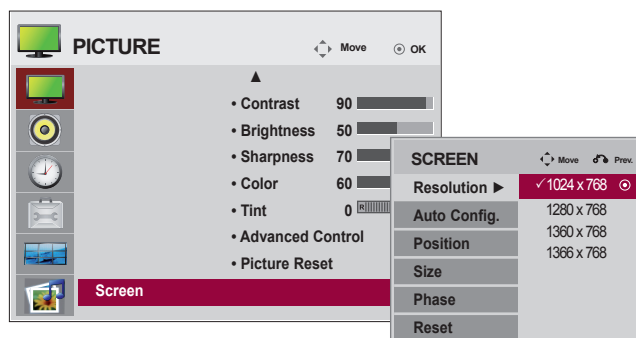
## Adjusting the display image

### Picture Reset



Return Picture Mode to the default factory settings.

### Screen



Adjust the screen video.

**Resolution** : To view a normal picture, match the resolution of RGB mode and selection of PC mode. This function works in the following mode: RGB[PC] mode.

**Auto Config.** (RGB PC input only) : This button is for the automatic adjustment of the screen position, clock and phase. This function is available for analog signals only.

**Position** : Moving the screen position.

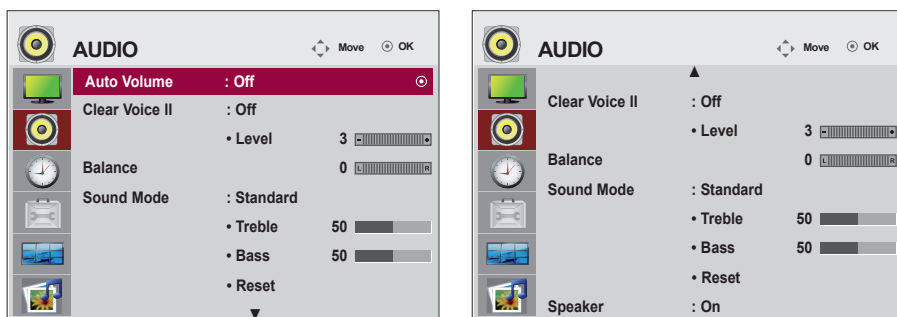
**Size** : Adjust the size of the screen.

**Phase** : To adjust the focus of the display. This item allows you to remove any horizontal noise and clear or sharpen the image of characters. This function is available for analog signals only.

**Reset** : Return Manual config. to the default factory settings.

# User Menus

## Adjusting the audio function



### Auto Volume

To adjust uneven sound volumes across all channels or signals automatically to the most appropriate level. To use this feature, select On.

### Clear Voice II

By differentiating other background sounds from the human speech range voices become clearer.

### Balance

Use this function to balance sound from the left and right speakers.

### Sound Mode

The best sound tone quality will be selected automatically depending on the video type that you're currently watching.

**Standard** : The most commanding and natural audio.

**Music** : Select this option to enjoy the original sound when listening to the music.

**Cinema** : Select this option to enjoy sublime sound.

**Sport** : Select this option to watch sports broadcasting.

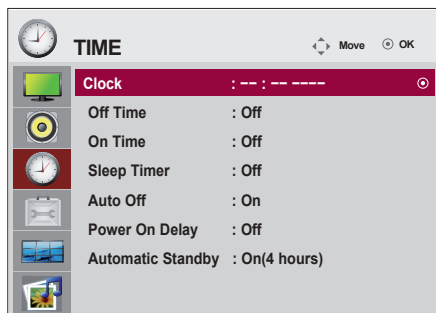
**Game** : To enjoy dynamic sound when playing a game.

### Speaker

You can disable the speaker outputs if you wish to listen to the audio via an external audio system.

# User Menus

## Adjusting the timer function



### Clock

If the current time is incorrect, reset the clock manually.

- 1) Press the **MENU** button and then use  $\wedge \vee < >$  button to select the Time menu, input OK button to enter.
- 2) Press the  $>$  button and then use  $\wedge \vee$  button to select clock menu.
- 3) Press the  $>$  button and then use  $< >$  button to select date
- 4) Press the  $\wedge \vee$  button and then use  $< >$  button to set the hour(00h to 23h).
- 5) Press the  $\wedge \vee$  button and then use  $< >$  button to set the minutes(00 min to 59 min).

### On/Off time

The off time automatically switches the set to standby at the pre-set time.

- 1) Press the **MENU** button and then use  $\wedge \vee < >$  button to select the Time menu, input OK button to enter.
- 2) Press the  $>$  button and then use  $\wedge \vee$  button to select On/Off Timer.
- 3) Press the  $>$  button and then use  $< >$  button to select date
- 4) Press the  $\wedge \vee$  button and then use  $< >$  button to set the hour(00h to 23h).
- 5) Press the  $\wedge \vee$  button and then use  $< >$  button to set the minutes(00 min to 59 min).
- 6) Press the  $\wedge \vee$  button ,According to the personal needs, choose to add button.

### Sleep timer

The power is automatically turned off when the time set by a user is passed.

- 1) Press the **MENU** button and then use  $\wedge \vee < >$  button to select the Time menu, input OK button to enter
- 2) Press the  $>$  button and then use  $\wedge \vee$  button to select Sleep timer menu.
- 3) Press the  $\wedge \vee$  button and then use  $< >$  button to select the minutes(Off to 240 min).

### Auto off

If Auto off is active and there is no input signal, the set switches to off mode automatically after 10 minutes.

- 1) Press the **MENU** button and then use  $\wedge \vee < >$  button to select the Timer menu, input OK button to enter.
- 2) Press the  $>$  button and then use  $\wedge \vee$  button to select the Auto off menu.
- 3) Press the  $>$  button and then use  $\wedge \vee$  button to select On or Off.

### Power on delay

When connecting multiple monitors and turning the power on, the monitors are turned on individually to prevent overload.

### Automatic Standby

If you do not use the monitor for more than 4 hours, it will be in standby mode automatically.

#### Note

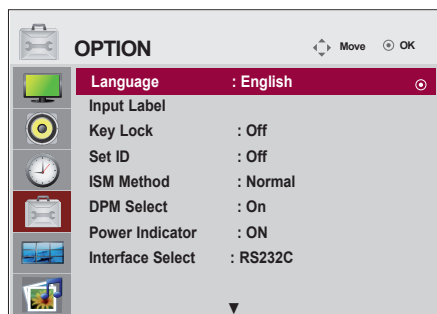


- In the event of power interruption (disconnection or power failure), the clock must be reset.
- Once the on or off time is set, these functions operate daily at the preset time.
- The scheduled power-off function works properly only when the device time is set correctly. When the scheduled power-on and power-off times are the same, the power-off time has priority over the power-on time if the set is turned on, and vice versa if the set is turned off.
- When On time is operated, input screen is turned on as it was turned off.
- The Automatic Standby function may not be available depending on the country.

# User Menus



## Selecting the options



### Language

To choose the language in which the control names are displayed.

### Input Label

Selects a label for each input source. For example, when connecting to PC in RGB mode, \* Select "PC" for the connecting device field. Otherwise, the screen may not display properly.

### Key Lock

Use the  $\wedge$   $\vee$  buttons to select **On** or **Off**. The monitor can be set up so that it can only be used with the remote control. This feature can prevent unauthorized viewing.

In order to lock the OSD screen adjustment, set the **Key Lock** tab to the 'On' position.

In order to unlock it, do the following :

Push the **MENU** button on the remote control and set **Key Lock** to the 'Off' position.

### Set ID

You can assign a unique **Set ID** NO (name assignment) to each product when several products are connected for display. Specify the number (1 to 99) using the < > button and exit. Use the assigned **Set ID** to individually control each product using the Product Control Program.

### ISM Method

Leaving a fixed image on the screen for a long time may cause damage to the screen and cause image burn-in. To use the product for a long period of time, use a screen saver on the PC or utilize the residual image prevention function on the product, and when the product is not used, turn off the power. Burn-in and related problems are not covered by the warranty on this product.

**Normal** : Leave on normal if you don't foresee image burn in being a problem.

**Orbiter** : May help prevent ghost images. However, it is best not to allow any fixed image to remain on the screen. To avoid a permanent image on the screen, the screen will move every 2 minutes.

**Inversion** : This function inverts the panel color of the screen. The panel color is automatically inverted every 30 minutes.

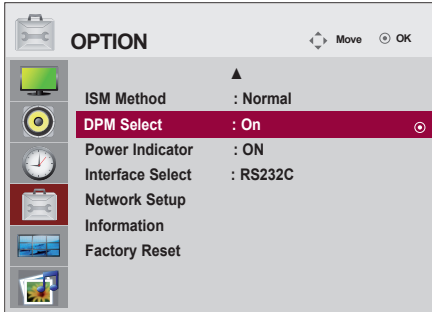
**White wash** : White wash fills the screen with solid white. This helps removes permanent images burned into the screen. A permanent image may be impossible to clear entirely with white wash.



# User Menus



## Selecting the options



### DPM Select

A user can choose to turn the power saving mode on / off.

### Power Indicator

Use this function to set the power indicator on the front side of the product to On or Off. If you set Off, it will go Off. If you set On at any time, the power indicator will automatically be turned on.

### Interface Select

Sets up network connections.

- **Network** : LAN - Enables communication via Ethernet.
- **RS-232C** : Enables communication via Serial.

### Network Setup

- **DHCP** : Allocates and sets up IP automatically.

## Deactivation



The purpose of deactivation is to allow deactivation of devices for users who have activated all the available devices through the web\_server and are blocked from activating more devices. DivX VOD allowed the consumer to activate up to 6 devices under one account, but to replace or deactivate any of those devices, the consumer had to contact DivX Support and request deletion. # Troubleshooting

## No image is displayed

## 'Key Lock On' message appears.

- The 'Key Lock On' message appears when pressing the Menu button.
  - The control locking function prevents unintentional OSD setting change due to careless usage. To unlock the controls, simultaneously press the Menu button and ► button for several seconds. (You cannot set this function using the remote control buttons. You can set this function in the product only.)

## The screen image looks abnormal.

- Horizontal noise appears or the characters look blurred.
  - D-Sub analog signal - Press the "AUTO" button in the remote control to automatically select an optimal screen status that fits into the current mode. If adjustment is not satisfactory, use the Phase OSD menu.
- The screen is displayed abnormally.
  - The proper input signal is not connected to the signal port. Connect the signal cable that matches with the source input signal.

## After-image appears on the product.

- After-image appears when the product is turned off.
  - If you use a fixed image for a long time, the pixels may be damaged quickly. Use the screen-saver function.



### Note

- **Vertical frequency:** To enable the user to watch the product display, screen image should be changed tens of times every second like a fluorescent lamp. The vertical frequency or refresh rate is the times of image display per second. The unit is Hz.
- **Horizontal frequency:** The horizontal interval is the time to display one vertical line. When 1 is divided by the horizontal interval, the number of horizontal lines displayed every second can be tabulated as the horizontal frequency. The unit is kHz.

- Do black spots appear on the screen?
  - Several pixels (red, green, white or black color) may appear on the screen, which can be attributable to the unique characteristics of the LCD panel. It is not a malfunction of the LCD.

## The operation does not work normally.

- The power suddenly turned off.
  - Is the sleep timer set?
  - Check the power control settings. Power interrupted.
  - "CAUTION! FAN STOP!"  
If the power is turned off after this message appears, it means that the fan is out of order. In this case, contact your local service center.

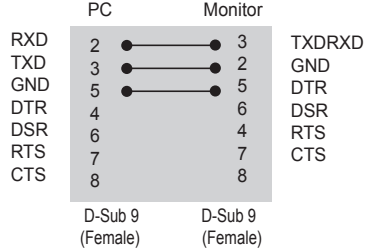

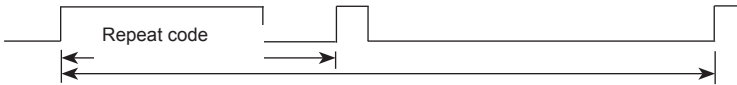

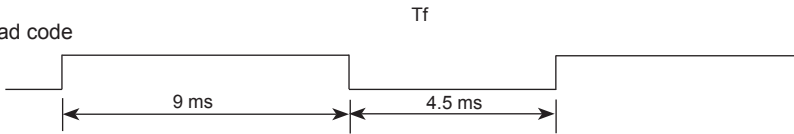

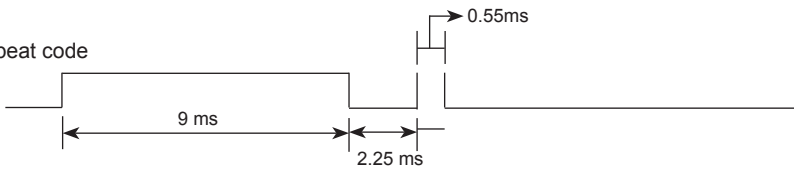

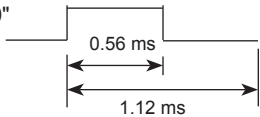
