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Important Notice

Please check to see if any problems you have encountered with your phone are described in this section before taking the phone in for service or calling a service representative.

1. Phone Memory

In order to make more memory available, you will have to manage your applications and delete some data, such as applications or messages.

Managing Applications

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** and tap **All settings** > **Apps**.
- 2 Tap a tab at the top of the screen, then scroll and tap the application you want to uninstall.
- 3 Tap Uninstall and then tap OK to confirm that you want to uninstall the desired application.

2. Optimizing Battery Life

You can extend your battery's life between charges by turning off features that you don't need to run constantly in the background. You can also monitor how applications and system resources consume battery power.

To extend the life of your battery

- Turn off radio communications that you aren't using, such as Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, or GPS.
 Wi-Fi will be set to On the first time you use your newly purchased phone.
- Lower screen brightness and set a shorter screen timeout.
- Turn off automatic syncing for Gmail™, Calendar, Contacts, and other applications.
- Some applications you have downloaded may cause your battery power to be reduced.
- While using downloaded applications, check the battery charge level.

To view the battery charge level

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the Menu Key
 and tap All settings > About phone
 > Battery > Battery status.
- 2 The battery status (charging or discharging)
- and level are displayed.

To monitor and control what uses the battery

1 From the Home screen, tap the Menu Key
2 and tap All settings > About phone
> Battery > Battery use.

 The bottom of the screen displays battery usage time. It also lists applications or services using battery power from greatest amount to least.

3. Installing an Open Source Operating System

Installing an open source operating system on your phone and not using the operating system provided by the manufacturer can cause your phone to malfunction.

Warning

- If you install and use an operating system other than the one provided by the manufacturer, your phone is no longer covered by the warranty.
- To protect your phone and personal data, download applications only from trusted sources, such as Play Store. If some applications are not properly installed on your phone, your phone may not work properly- or serious errors may occur. You will need to uninstall those applications and all of its data and settings from the phone.

4. Using the Pattern, PIN, or Password to Unlock Your Phone

Set an unlock Pattern, PIN, or Password to secure your phone. To set the screen lock, follow the process below.

Tap the Menu Key , tap All settings > Lock screen > Select screen lock and select between Pattern, PIN or Password.

NOTE

In case that you would have trouble with the pattern, you can unlock the screen with a PIN as a backup.

Warning

Take precautions when using a Pattern, PIN, or Password. It is very important that you remember the screen unlock information you set. You are allowed 5 attempts to enter your screen unlock information. If you used up all 5 opportunities, you will have to wait 30 seconds to attempt unlocking the phone again.

When you can't recall your Unlock Pattern, PIN, or Password:

If you logged into a Google account on the phone and failed to use the correct pattern

5 times, tap Forgot Pattern? You will be required to sign in with your Google account and prompted to create a new unlock pattern. If you have set a backup PIN, you can unlock the screen by entering the backup PIN.

If you haven't created a Google account on the phone or you forgot your PIN or Password, you need to perform a hard reset.

5. Hard Factory Reset

There are two ways of performing the hard reset (depending on your Android OS version). Check your current Android OS version before continuing.

NOTE

- From the Home screen, tap the Menu Key

 Settings > About this phone.
- or -
- From the Home screen, tap the Menu Key
 > All settings > About phone >
 Software information

Caution

If you perform a hard reset, all user applications and user data will be deleted. Please remember to back up any important data before performing a hard reset.

Read ALL steps before attempting.

Previous steps (Android 2.2 Froyo/Android 2.3 Gingerbread)

- 1 Turn the phone off.
- 2 Press and hold Volume Down Key
 - + Power/Lock Key at the same time.
- 3 When the LG logo appears, release the keys.
- 4 Use the Volume Keys to scroll to Yes
 -- delete all user data and tap the Menu
 Key
- 5 Use the **Volume Keys** to highlight **reboot** system now and tap the **Menu Key**

Updated steps (Android 4.0 Ice Cream Sandwich)

- 1 Turn the phone off.
- 2 Press and hold the following keys at the same time: Volume Down Key Power/Lock Key 14 .
- 3 Release the keys when the FACTORY HARD RESET screen appears.
- 4 Read the warning and press the Power/ Lock Key to confirm. Press any other key to cancel.

- 5 Press the Power/Lock Key to confirm once more or press any other key to cancel.
- 6 Your device will perform a hard reset.

6. Using Safe Mode

To recover your phone when malfunctioning.

- 1 Turn off your phone and reboot. When the LG logo is displayed, press and hold the **Volume Down Key** . Your Home screen will then be displayed with the words "Safe mode" in the lower left corner.
- 2 From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** and tap **All settings** > **Apps**.
- 3 Choose the application you wish to uninstall and tap **Uninstall** and **OK** to confirm.
- 4 After uninstalling the application, turn off and reboot your phone.

7. Using a microSD Card

Pictures, music and video files can be saved to external memory. Before saving these files to external memory, you need to insert a microSD card. If you have not inserted a microSD card, you will not be able to save these items on external memory.

Warning

Do not remove the microSD card without unmounting it first. Otherwise, it may damage the microSD card as well as your phone and the data stored on the microSD card may be corrupted. To remove the microSD card safely, from the Home screen, tap the Menu Key and tap All settings > Storage > Inmount SD card

8. Connecting your phone to a computer via USB

- Use the USB cable that was provided with your phone to connect the phone to a USB port on your computer. You'll receive a notification that the USB is connected.
- 2 Check Mass storage and you can transfer files between your phone's microSD card and the computer.

When the phone is connected as Mass storage, you receive a notification. Your phone's microSD card is installed as a drive on your computer. You can now copy files to and from the microSD card.

TIP

You cannot access the microSD card from your phone while connected as Mass storage. So you cannot use applications that rely on the microSD card, such as Music.

To disconnect your phone from the computer, carefully follow your computer's instructions to disconnect USB devices correctly, to avoid losing information on the card. Then follow the instructions below.

- 1 Open the Notifications panel and tap **USB** connected
- 2 Tap Charge only and safely disconnect the phone from your computer.

9. Unlock screen when using data connection

Your screen will go dark if untouched for a period of time when using a data connection. To turn on your LCD screen, press the **Power/Lock Key**

10. Hold the phone straight up

Please hold the mobile phone straight up as a regular phone.

While making/receiving calls or sending/ receiving data, try to avoid holding the lower part of the phone where the antenna is located. It may affect call quality.

11. When the screen freezes

If the phone does not respond to user input or the screen freezes:

Press and hold the **Power/Lock Key**or for 10 seconds to turn it off.

Then, press and hold the **Power/Lock Key**or again for 3 seconds to reboot the phone.

Do not connect your phone when you power on/off your PC

Make sure to disconnect your phone from the PC when powering your PC on or off as it might result in PC errors.

To turn on the phone, press and hold the **Power/Lock Key** for 3 seconds.

To turn off the phone, press the **Power/Lock Key** for 3 seconds and tap **Power off** and OK to confirm


Placing a heavy object on the phone or sitting on it can damage its LCD and touch screen functionalities. Do not cover the LCD's proximity sensor with a protective film. This can cause the sensor to malfunction

- Tap the **Menu Key** whenever you open an application to check what options are available
- If your phone has errors when you use it or you cannot turn it on, remove the battery, install it again and turn it on after 5 seconds.



Getting Started

Installing the SIM card and battery

Before you can start exploring your new phone, you'll need to set it up. To insert the SIM card and battery:

1 Hold the phone on your hand firmly. With the other hand, lift the back cover using the fingertip cutout located on the bottom of the cover and remove it.



2 Slide the SIM card into the SIM card slot. Make sure the gold contact area on the card is facing downwards.



3 Insert the battery into place by aligning the gold contacts on the phone and the battery.



4 Replace the back cover of the phone (as demonstrated below). Apply a steady downward pressure until the battery cover clicks into place.



Charging your phone

1 Connect the adapter and USB cable as shown below. The LG logo on the USB cable should face toward you.



2 Plug the USB cable (as shown below) into the phone's Charger/Accessory Port. Make sure the 'B' side is facing upwards.



NOTE

The battery must be fully charged initially to improve battery lifetime.

NOTE

Your phone has an internal antenna. Be careful not to scratch or damage this rear area, as that will cause loss of performance.

Inserting a microSD card

Insert a microSD™ card to use the camera and other multimedia features. Multimedia contents can be saved in the microSD card. The LG THRLL46 has a microSD card pre-installed

NOTE

This device supports up to a 32GB microSD card.


 Turn the phone off before inserting or removing the microSD card. Remove the back cover.



Getting Started

2 Slide the slot protector to the left to unlock it and flip it open. Then insert the microSD card into the slot. Make sure the gold contact area is facing downwards.





3 Flip the slot protection down to close it. Then slide the slot protection to the right to lock it and replace the battery cover.





Removing the microSD card

To safely remove the microSD card from your phone, first you need to unmount it.

NOTE

On Android OS 2.2 and above, you can download applications from Play Store and store them on a microSD card as well as on the phone. Due to this feature, if you skip the unmount procedure, it can cause an error because information between the microSD card and the phone is not accorded properly. In the worst case, the microSD card can be corrupted or damaged.

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the Menu Key
 and tap All settings > Storage >
 Unmount SD card > OK.
- 2 Remove the battery cover, slide the slot protector to the left to unlock it and flip it open.
- 3 Remove the microSD card from the slot.

Warning

Do not remove the microSD card without unmounting it first. Otherwise, it may damage the microSD card as well as your phone, and the data stored on the microSD card may be corrupted.

Formatting the microSD card

Your microSD card may already be formatted. If it isn't, you must format it before you can use it

NOTE

All files on the card are deleted when you format the microSD card.

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the Menu Key
 and tap All settings > Storage >
 Unmount SD card > OK.
- 2 Tap Erase SD card twice.
- 3 If you set an unlock pattern, enter it and tap Erase Everything. The card will then be formatted and ready to use.

NOTE

If there is content on your microSD card, the folder structure may be different after formatting since all the files will have been deleted

Switching between and exiting applications

Multi-tasking is easy with Android because open applications keep running even when you open another application. There is no need to quit an application before opening another. Use and switch among several open applications. Android manages each application, stopping and starting them as needed, to ensure that idle applications don't consume resources unnecessarily.

Switching between applications

Touch and hold the **Home Key** . A list of recently used applications will be displayed. Then tap the application you want to access.

To stop/exit an application

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key**and tap **All settings** > **Apps**.
- 2 Tap a tab and select the desired application.
- 3 Tap Stop (or Force stop) to close the application.

Your Home screen

Touch screen tips

With the touch of your finger, you can access available applications, make menu selections, and access data saved to your phone. The following terms are used for describing the different available actions using the touch screen:

Tap - A single finger tap selects items, links, shortcuts and letters on the on-screen keyboard.

Touch and hold - Touch and hold an item on the screen by touching it and not lifting your finger until an action occurs. For example, to open a contact's available options, touch and hold the contact in the Contacts list until the context menu opens.

Drag - Touch and hold an item for a moment and then, without lifting your finger, move your finger on the screen until you reach the target position. You can drag items on the Home screen to reposition them.

Swipe or slide - To swipe or slide, quickly move your finger across the surface of the screen, without pausing when you first touch it (so you don't drag an item instead). For example, you can slide the screen up or down

to scroll through a list, or browse through the different Home screens by swiping from left to right (and vice versa).

Double-tap - Double-tap to zoom on a Web page or a map. For example, quickly double-tap a section of a Web page to adjust that section to fit the width of the screen. You can also double-tap to zoom in and out when using Maps.

Pinch-to-Zoom - Use your index finger and thumb in a pinch or spread motion to zoom in or out when using the browser, Maps, or browsing pictures.

Rotate the screen - From many applications and menus, the orientation of the screen adjusts to the device's physical orientation.

NOTE

- To select an item, tap the center of the icon.
- Do not to press too hard; the touch screen is sensitive enough to pick up a light, firm touch.
- Use the tip of your finger to tap the option you want. Be careful not to tap any other keys or icons.

Proximity sensor

When receiving and making calls, this sensor automatically turns the backlight off and locks the touch keypad by sensing when the phone is near your ear. This extends battery life and prevents the touch keypad from activating unintentionally during calls.

Lock your phone

When you are not using the LG THRILL 49 press the **Power/Lock Key** to lock your phone. This helps prevent accidental presses and saves battery power.

Also, if you do not use the phone for a while, the Home screen or other screen you are viewing, is automatically replaced with the lock screen after 30 seconds (depending on the screen timeout settings) of inactivity to conserve the battery and prevent pocket dialing.

To wake up your phone, press the **Power/ Lock Key**The lock screen will appear. Swipe the screen in any direction to unlock. The last screen you were working on opens.

NOTE

- The automatic screen timeout can be configured manually in Settings. To change it, tap the Menu Key All settings
 Display > Screen timeout.
- If there are any programs running when you lock the phone, they may still be running in lock mode. It is recommended that you exit all programs before entering the lock mode to avoid unnecessary charges (e.g., phone call, web access and data communications).

Setting a pattern, PIN, or password:

You can also unlock the screen by drawing your own unlock Pattern or entering a PIN or Password to add more security to your device.

Caution

If there are more than 5 pattern drawing errors in a row, you will be required to wait for 30 seconds to retry.

Quick Switch to Silent Mode

To quickly set your phone to silent mode, press and hold the **Volume Down Key** until you see on the Status Bar.

- or -

Touch and hold # • on the dial pad for 2 seconds.

- or -

Slide the Status Bar down and tap until appears.

- or -

Press and hold the Power/Lock Key

and tap or 🗐.

Home screen

Simply swipe your finger to the left or right to view the different Home screen canvases. You can also customize each panel with shortcuts, widgets, and folders.

Quick Keys

On the Home screen, you can view Quick Keys at the bottom of the screen. The Quick Keys provide easy, one-tap access to the functions you use the most.

Phone Key - Tap to bring up the keypad to make a call.

3D Space Key - Tap to access 3D Space.

Browser Key - Tap to open your phone's web browser

Apps Key - Tap to view all of your installed applications.

NOTE

To add an icon to the Quick Keys, drag and drop it in the Quick Keys bar. To remove an icon, touch and hold it and remove it from the Quick Keys bar.

Customizing your Home screen

You can customize your Home screen by adding quick access elements, such as shortcuts, widgets, folders or changing the wallpaper.

- Apps: Add shortcuts to applications on the Home screen
- Downloads: Add shortcuts to downloaded applications on the Home screen.
- Widgets: Add dynamically updating widgets to your Home screen to allow quick access to applications without opening the full application.
- **Wallpapers**: Change the Home screen wallpaper.

To add Widgets, Shortcuts, and Folders on the Home screen:

- 1 Select a location (Home screen panels) to add an item by swiping the Home screen from left to right or vice versa.
- 2 Touch and hold an empty part of the Home screen.
- 3 Tap the type of item you want to add on the screen: Apps, Downloads, Widgets, or Wallpapers.
- 4 Tap the desired app or widget.
- 5 You will see a new icon on the Home screen. To place it on a different canvas touch and hold it to unlock it from its current position, then drag it to the desired location on the desired canvas and release your finger from the screen.

IP

If there is no available space on a particular Home screen canvas, you must delete or remove an item before you can add another item. In this case, you have the option of switching to another Home screen panel.

NOTE

Customizing app icons on the Home screen

You can customize each application icon with other available system icons.

1 Touch and hold an application icon until it's unlocked from its current position. Then drop it on the screen. The editing icon will appear in the upper right corner of the application.



2 Tap the application icon again and select the desired icon design.



Returning to a recently used application

- 1 Touch and hold the **Home Key** . The screen will display the icons of applications that you have used recently.
- 2 Tap an icon to open its application or tap the Back Key to return to the current application.

Home screen clean view

You can see the wallpaper without items on the Home screen by pinching out. Pinch in or tap the **Back Key** to see applications and widgets again.



Notifications panel

Notification icons on the Status Bar report the arrival of new messages, calendar events, alarms, as well as ongoing events, such as when you are in a call. You can view a list of all recent notifications.

The Notifications panel runs across the top of your screen.





Touch and hold the Status Bar and slide it down with your finger. From here you can manage various options, which include QuickMemo, Sound mode, Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, GPS, and any other options you add to the Quick Settings.

Viewing the Status Bar

The Status Bar uses different icons to display phone information, such as signal strength, new messages, battery life, and active Bluetooth and data connections.

Below is a table explaining the meaning of icons you are likely to see in the Status Bar.

On-screen Keyboard

You can enter text using the on-screen keyboard. The on-screen keyboard displays automatically on the screen when you need to enter text. To manually display the keyboard, simply tap a text field where you want to enter text.

There are two types of keypads that you can use: Android keyboard and Google voice keyboard.

To select the keyboard:

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the Menu Key

 > All settings > Language & input

 > Default (under KEYBOARD & INPUT

 METHODS)
- Select the desired keyboard between Android keyboard and Google voice typing.

NOTE

Default is English (US) Android keyboard but if you want to change to Google voice typing, checkmark **Google voice typing**.

Android keyboard -Letters Entry



- Shift Key Tap once to capitalize the next letter you type. Double-tap for all caps.
- Number and Symbols Key Tap to change the input to number and symbol entry.
- Oelete Key Tap to delete characters to the left of the cursor.
- Emoticon Key Tap to enter various emoticons.
- **5** Space Key Tap to enter a space.

Android keyboard -Numbers and Symbols Entry



- Alt Key Tap to enter additional symbols. The keyboard will change to alternate characters.
- Letters Key Tap to change the input to letters entry.
- Delete Key Tap to delete characters to the left of the cursor.
- Emoticon Key Tap to enter various emoticons.
- Space Key Tap to enter a space.

Entering special characters

The on-screen keyboard allows you to enter special characters (e.g., "á").

To enter a special character, press and hold the desired letter key (press the "a" key for example).

After the special character appears, slide your finger over it and lift your finger to enter it.

Google Account Setup

The first time you open a Google application on your phone, you will be required to sign in with your existing Google account. If you do not have a Google account, you will be prompted to create one.

Creating your Google account

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the **Apps Key**
- 2 Tap Settings > Accounts & sync > ADD ACCOUNT > Google > Create.
- **3** Tap a text field to open the keyboard and enter your name. Then tap **Next**.
- 4 Enter your username and tap **Next**. Your phone will communicate with Google servers and check for username availability.
- 5 Enter and re-enter your password. Then follow the instructions and enter the required and optional information about the account. Wait while the server creates your account.

Signing into your Google account

1 From the Home screen, tap the **Apps Key**

- 2 Tap Settings > Accounts & sync > ADD ACCOUNT > Google > Existing.
- **3** Enter your email and password and tap **Sign in**.
- 4 After signing in, you can use Gmail™ and take advantages of Google services on your phone.
- 5 Once you have set up your Google account, your phone will be automatically synchronized with your Google account on the web. (Depending on your synchronization settings.)

After signing in, your phone will sync with your Google services, such as Gmail™, Contacts, Google Calendar, and Picasa photo albums. You can also use Google Maps™, download applications from Play Store, back up your settings to Google servers, and take advantage of other Google services on your phone.

IMPORTANT

 Some applications work only with the first Google Account you add. If you plan to use more than one Google Account with your phone, be sure to sign into the one you want to use with such applications first. When you sign in, your contacts, Gmail messages, Calendar events, and other information

from these applications and services on the web are synchronized with your phone. If you don't sign into a Google Account during setup, you will be prompted to sign in or to create a Google Account the first time you start an application that requires one, such as Gmail or Play Store.

 If you have an enterprise account through your company or other organization, your IT department may have special instructions on how to sign into that account.

Calls

Making a call

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the **Phone Key**to open the keypad.
- 2 Enter the number using the keypad. To delete a digit, tap the **Delete Key** <</p>
- 3 Tap the Call Key ____ to make a call.
- 4 To end a call, tap the End Key ...



To enter "+" to make international calls, touch and hold $\boxed{0}$.

Calling your contacts

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the **Apps Key**iii and then tap **Contacts** to open your contacts.
- 2 Scroll through the contact list or tap the Search contacts field and enter the first letter(s) of the contact you want to call. You can also tap the letters at the right side of the screen.
- 3 In the list that is displayed, touch the contact you want to call.
- 4 In the Contact info screen, tap the phone number you wish to call.

Answering and rejecting a call

When the screen is locked

When your phone rings, swipe the **Answer** icon in any direction to answer the incoming call.

Swipe the **Decline** icon in any direction to decline an incoming call.

When the screen is unlocked

When your phone rings, tap the Answer Key

- to answer the call. Tap the **Decline Key**
- to reject an incoming call.

NOTE

Tap or swipe the **Quick msg** icon if you want to send a quick message to the caller. This is useful if you need to reply to the caller during a meeting. If the caller is unknown, this option is not available.

Adjusting the in-call volume

To adjust the in-call volume during a call, use the Volume Keys on the right side of the phone.

Making a second call

- 1 During your first call, tap the Menu Key

 → > Add call and dial the number.
 You can also see a list of recently dialed numbers by tapping Call logs → , or you can search your contacts by tapping Contacts → and select the number you want to call.
- 2 Tap the Call Key 📞 to make the call.
- 3 Both calls are displayed on the call screen. Your initial call is locked and put on hold.

After signing up for this service, your information is synced on a regular basis. You can find more information on this service and access your online address book at www.att.com/addressbook. You can find the synchronization menu for the service by tapping the Menu Key Accounts & sync > AT&T Address Book.

Messaging/Email

Messaging

Your phone combines text and multimedia messages into one intuitive, easy-to-use menu.

Conversation View

Messages exchanged with another party are displayed in chronological order so that you can conveniently see an overview of your conversation.

Sending a message

- 1 Tap Messaging on the Home screen, then tap to create a new message.
- 2 Enter a contact name or phone number in the To field. As you enter the contact name, matching contacts appear. You can tap a suggested recipient. You can also add multiple contacts.

NOTE

You will be charged for a text message for every person you send the message to.

- 3 Tap the text field to start entering your message.
- 4 Tap the Menu Key to open the options menu. Choose from any of the available options.
- 5 Tap **Send** to send your message.

Warning

The 160-character limit may vary from country to country depending on how the text message is coded and the language used in the message.

Warning

If an image, video, or audio file is added to a text message, it will be automatically converted into a multimedia message and you will be charged accordingly.

NOTE

When you get a text message during a call, there will be an audible notification.

Using smilies

Liven up your messages using smilies.

When writing a new message, tap or the Menu Key or then tap Insert smiley.

Changing your message settings

Your phone's message settings are predefined so you can send messages immediately. You can change the settings based on your preferences.

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Fmail

Port number — Normally each account's default port number will be displayed.

The Accounts Screen

The **Accounts** screen lists your **Combined Inbox** and each of your email accounts.

Messaging/Email

If you are viewing an account's Inbox, tap the Menu Key and then tap Accounts.

To make a shortcut to the Inbox of an account:





Using SmartShare

SmartShare uses DLNA (Digital Living Network Alliance) technology to share digital content through a wireless network. Both devices must be DLNA certified to support this feature.

To turn SmartShare on and allow sharing contents

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the **Apps Key**
- 2 Tap the Menu Key > Settings.

- 3 Tap **Discoverable** to allow your device to be detected by other devices.
- ➤ Tap Always accept requests if you would like to automatically accept sharing requests from other devices.
- Tap Receive files if you would like to allow the other devices to upload media files to my phone.

NOTE

Make sure that the microSD card is correctly mounted and the **Receive files** option in the Settings menu is checked.

- 4 Under the Shared contents section, touch to checkmark the types of content you would like to share. Choose from Photos, Videos, and Music.
- 5 SmartShare is now activated and ready to share contents

To control your renderer devices

Let your renderer device (e.g., TV) play multimedia contents from your remote content library (e.g., PC).

NOTE

Make sure that the DLNA functionality of your devices is properly configured (e.g., TV and PC).

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the Apps Key
 - 📖 > SmartShare 👺 .
- 2 Tap the **To** icon **a** and select the device from the renderer device list
- **3** Tap the **From** icon and select the device from the remote content library.
- 4 You can browse the content library.
- 5 Touch and hold a content thumbnail and tap
 Play or tap the Menu Key > Play.

To share contents from your phone to your renderer device (e.g., TV)

NOTE

Make sure that your renderer device is properly configured.

- 1 While viewing media in the Gallery, tap
 - : Need to be connected network
 - : Select the device on network
 - in: The content is currently being shared through SmartShare.
- 2 Select the device from renderer lists to play the files.

NOTE

Follow the similar steps to use the Video Player or Polaris Office to share contents.

NOTICE

Check that your device is connected with your home network using Wi-Fi connection to use this application.

Some DLNA enabled devices (e.g. TV) support only the DMP feature of DLNA and will not appear in the renderer device list. Your device might not be able to play some contents.

To download contents from the remote content library

Some contents are not supported.

To upload contents to the remote content library

About Google applications

Google applications, including mobile versions of Gmail, Google Talk, Google Calendar, and Google Maps, are loaded on your phone.

Google Maps™

To open Google Maps and view your location

- 1 From the Home screen, tap the **Apps Key**

The map centers on a blue arrow that indicates your location. A blue circle around the arrow indicates that your actual location is within the circle.

To get an address and additional information for a location

Touch and hold a location on the map. A balloon with the address and a thumbnail from Street View (if available) opens over the location

► Tap the balloon to access additional options.

To view map, satellite, or traffic layers

➤ Tap Layers on the map and select a layer option. You can choose from Traffic, Satellite. Terrain, and others.

Searching For Locations and Places

You can search for a location and view it on a map. You can also search for places on the map that you're viewing.

To search for a location

- 1 While viewing a map, tap at the bottom of the screen. You can also tap the **Search Key**

You can search for businesses, points of interest, and other features along your route.

When you search while navigating, your results include locations along your route. rather than locations that are near your current location

► When you're finished, tap Navigate 🙏 to return to Navigation View.



Clear Map

Clear any information, such as routes and search results, from the map.

Latitude

Finding Your Friends with Google LatitudeTM

Google Latitude lets you and your friends view each others' locations on maps and get directions to your friends' locations using Google Latitude, Your location is not shared

automatically. It is by invitation only.

You must join Latitude and then invite your friends to view your location or accept invitations from your friends.

To join Latitude

► While viewing a map, tap at the top left corner of the screen and then Join

The first time you join Latitude, you're prompted to accept or reject the Google privacy policy. After you've joined Latitude, the Join Latitude option changes to

Latitude

To open Latitude

After you join Latitude, you can open it to find your friends and view their updates.

While viewing a map, tap at the top left corner of the screen and then Latitude.

To invite friends to share their locations

After you join Latitude, you can start sharing your location with your friends. Only friends whom you have explicitly invited or accepted can see your location.

- 1 Open **Latitude** and tap .
- 2 Tap Select from Contacts or Add via email address in the menu that opens.

3 Tap Add friends at the bottom of the screen.

If your friends already use Latitude, they receive an email request and a notification on Latitude. If they have not yet joined Latitude, they receive an email inviting them to sign in to Latitude with their Google Account.

To find places

To purchase a paid app, you'll need to set up a payment method with Google CheckoutTM. You have the option to use a credit card or charge to your carrier bill.

GmailTM can be configured when you first set up your phone. Tap the Menu Key of the following additional options: Label settings, Settings, Help, and Send feedback.

Compose - Allows you to compose a new message.

Search - Allows you to search your account

Labels • Allows you to view the account's labels. 57 Google Applications

Refresh \mathcal{Z} - Allows you to refresh the account to view new activity.

Google Talk™

Google Talk™ is Google's instant messaging program. It lets you communicate with other people who also use Google Talk™.

The following options are available.

Add friend ___ - Send invitations to chat.

Search ___ - It searches for contacts to chat with or any chat records that contain the word(s) you entered.

Tap the **Menu Key** for the following options:

Display options - Allows you to change the way your contacts are displayed.

Sign out - Sign out from chat.

Settings - Allows you to adjust various settings.

Help - Allows you to view help topics about Talk.

Send feedback - Allows you to send feedback about Talk to Google.

Additional charges apply when connecting to these services and downloading content. Check data charges with your network provider.

To display the Browser toolbar, touch and drag up at the bottom of the screen.

- Back Moves to the previous web page.
- Forward Used in conjunction with the Back Key. This allows you to go back and forth between web pages without opening multiple windows.
- Homepage Redirects you to the home page.
- New window Opens a new window.
- Bookmark Allows you to manage your bookmarks

Using options

Tap the **Menu Key** to view the following options:

Refresh - Alows you to reload the current web page.

Save to bookmarks - Allows you to bookmark the current web page.

Share page - Allows you send the web address (URL) of the web page to others.

Find on page - Allows you to search for text on the web page.






On-Screen Phone

On-Screen Phone allows you to view your mobile phone screen from a PC via a USB or Bluetooth connection. You can also control your mobile phone from your PC, using the mouse or keyboard.

On-Screen Phone icons

On-Screen Phone features

- Real-time transfer and control: displays and controls your mobile phone screen when connected to your PC.
- Mouse control: allows you to control your mobile phone by using the mouse to click and drag on your PC screen.
- Text input with keyboard: allows you to compose a text message or note using your computer keyboard.

 File transfer (mobile phone to PC): sends a file from your mobile phone (e.g. photos, videos, music and Polaris Office files) to your PC. Simply right-click on the file and drag it to send it to your PC.

NOTE

This feature is only applied in Gallery, Music, Video Player and Polaris Office.

- File transfer (PC to mobile phone): sends files from your PC to your mobile phone.
 Just select the files you wish to transfer and drag and drop them into the On-Screen Phone window.
- Real-time event notifications: prompts a pop-up to inform you of any incoming calls or text messages, as well as alarm and event notifications.

Notice

The Camera preview, videos and contents from 3D mode(3D Camera, 3D Games & Apps, 3D Guide, YouTube 3D, 3D Gallery) are not supported in On-Screen Phone, so they are not available on the PC.

How to install On-Screen Phone on your PC

Visit LG.com (http://www.lg.com/us). Locate the search box in the upper right corner of the

page and enter your device's model number (LGP925). From the **SUPPORT** list, select your model. Scroll down and select the **On-Screen Phone** software. When prompted, select **Run** to install **On-Screen Phone** on your PC.

Click G in the top left corner of the On-Screen Phone window. Alternatively, drag the Status Bar down and tap "On-Screen Phone". Tap "Yes" in the Disconnect window.

If you Force stop the On-Screen Phone application via the Manage applications menu (Settings > Apps > All > On-Screen Phone > Force stop), you must restart your phone.

Settings

The **Settings** application contains most of the tools for customizing and configuring your phone. All of the settings in the Settings application are described in this section.

To open the Settings application

- From the Home screen, tap the **Apps Key**
- From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key**> All settings.

Wi-Fi

Drag the **Wi-Fi** switch **To** to the right to turn on Wi-Fi functionality to connect to available Wi-Fi networks. Drag it to the left to turn it off

Network notification – Checkmark to be notified when a Wi-Fi network is in range when you launch an application.

AT&T WI-FI HOT SPOT SETTING

 Auto connect — Checkmark to connect to an available AT&T Wi-Fi Hot Spot automatically.

WI-FI NETWORKS – The list of all of the Wi-Fi networks that are within access range. Tap one to connect to it.

Advanced – Tap the Menu Key 2 > Advanced to set the following advanced options.

- ► **Keep Wi-Fi on during sleep:** Allows you to keep Wi-Fi on during sleep.
- Avoid poor connections: Don't use a Wi-Fi network unless it has a good Internet connection.
- ► MAC address: Allows you to view the MAC address.
- ► IP address: Allows you to view the IP address

NOTE

Tap **SCAN** at the bottom of the screen to scan for available Wi-Fi networks. Tap **ADD NETWORK** at the bottom of the screen to add a new network

Bluetooth

Drag the **Bluetooth** switch me to the right to turn on Bluetooth functionality to connect to Bluetooth devices. Drag it to the left to turn it off.

Bluetooth settings

Turn Bluetooth on to access the following settings:

LG-P925 – Allows you to rename your phone as it is seen by other Bluetooth compatible devices.

Make phone visible — Tap to allow other Bluetooth devices to see your phone for pairing and connection. The Bluetooth name checkbox turns blue while it is visible, then turns white when it's no longer visible.

Limit mobile data usage — Checkmark to limit your mobile data. Your mobile data connection will be disabled when you reach the limit you set.

Data usage cycle – Displays your current data usage cycle. Tap the dropdown menu icon to change the cycle date.

Data usage graphic – Displays your data usage on a graph which allows you to move your data limit on the graph if you checkmark the Set mobile data limit setting.

Data usage applications – Applications are displayed with their data usage on a bar graph. Tap one to see more detailed information

To access advanced options, tap the **Menu Key** .

Data roaming: Allows you to use data connections when you are roaming.

Restrict background data: Allows you to disable sync in the background while using a mobile network

Show Wi-Fi usage: Allows you to view your data usage via Wi-Fi.

Call

The Call menu allows you to manage various call settings.

Fixed dialing numbers - Allows you to manage your fixed dialing numbers.

VOICEMAIL

Voicemail service – Allows you to change your voicemail service. The default is My carrier

Voicemail settings – Allows you to change your voicemail settings (e.g., the number that dials your voicemail service).

OTHER CALL SETTINGS

Call reject – Allows you to set call rejection and manage reject list.

Call reject mode – Allows you to choose what calls to reject.

Rejection list – Checkmark Private numbers to reject all private numbers. Tap 🛨 to add number from Contacts, Call logs, or New number.

Quick messages – Allows you to manage your Quick messages. Tap
to create a new quick message, tap a message to edit it, or tap to delete the message.

Power button ends call – Checkmark to press the Power/Lock Key to end the call, instead of turning off screen.

TTY mode – Allows you to set the TTY mode to communicate with other TTY devices

Hearing aids – Checkmark to turn on hearing aid compatibility.

Call duration – Allows you to check call duration about Last call, Dialed calls, Received calls, and All calls

Caller ID – Allows you to set your caller ID option.

Sound settings – Allows you to set various sound settings (ringtone, notifications, touch feedback).

Additional settings – Allows you to set call forwarding and call waiting.

More...

This menu allows you to manage other network and wireless settings.

Airplane mode — Checkmark to disable all wireless connections. Some locations may require you to turn off your phone's wireless connections by placing your phone in Airplane mode.

Portable Wi-Fi hotspot — Checkmark Portable Wi-Fi hotspot to allow you to turn your Android™ device into a portable Wi-Fi hotspot to share your Android™ device's Internet connection with one or more computers or other devices.

VPN – Allows you to set up and manage Virtual Private Networks (VPNs).

Mobile networks — Allows you to set up options for roaming, networks, and APNs (Access Point Names).

DEVICE

The Device section allow you to configure and manage the general device functions such as sound and display options.

Sound

This menu allows you to manage your device's sound settings.

Sound profile – Allows you to set the Sound mode. Choose between **Sound**,

Vibrate only, and Silent.

Volumes – Allows you to individually set the volumes for Phone ringtone, Notification sound, Touch feedback & system, and Music, video, games, and other media. Move the slider icon on each volume bar to set the volume

RINGTONE & NOTIFICATIONS

Phone ringtone – Allows you to set the ringtone for calls. You can also add a ringtone by tapping 🛨 at the top right corner of the screen.

Notification sound — Allows you to set the sound for notifications. You can also add a sound by tapping ⊕ at the top right corner of the screen.

Ringtone with vibration – Checkmark to set the phone to also vibrate for calls and notifications.

Quiet time — Tap the Quiet time switch to enable this function. Tap Quiet time to open a screen to set the days and

times to automatically turn off all sounds except for alarms and media.

TOUCH FEEDBACK & SYSTEM

Dial pad touch tones — Checkmark to set the phone to make a sound when you tap the dialpad.

Touch sounds – Checkmark to set the phone to make a sound when you tap an item to activate it (e.g., tapping a checkbox).

Screen lock sound – Checkmark to set the phone to make a sound when the screen is locked using the **Power/Lock Key** and also when it is unlocked

Vibrate on touch – Checkmark to set the phone to vibrate when you tap the front keys.

Display

The Display menu allows you to manage your phone's display settings.

Brightness – Allows you to adjust the brightness of the screen. For changing brightness automatically, checkmark

Automatic brightness.

Auto-rotate screen – Checkmark to set the phone to automatically rotate the screen based on the phone orientation (portrait or landscape).

Screen timeout – Allows you to set the amount of time before the screen times-out.

Animation – Allows you to set the device to use the available animations.

Screen swipe effect – Allows you to select the effect to use when you swipe to change screens.

Wallpaper – Allows you to set the wallpaper to use on your Home screen.

Scroll wallpaper – Checkmark to scroll wallpaper with screen.

Scroll screens circularly – Checkmark to set the Home screens to scroll continuously, eliminating the need to scroll back in the opposite direction when you reach one end.

Home backup & restore – Allows you to backup and restore app/widget configuration.

Lock screen

This menu allows you to manage your Lock screen settings.

SCREEN

Select screen lock – Allows you to set how to secure your phone from unauthorized use.

Wallpaper – Allows you to set your Lock screen wallpaper.

Clocks & shortcuts — Allows you to set the clock widget displayed on the Lock screen. Also allows you to change the shortcuts on the Lock screen when it is set to the **Swipe** method. To display the shortcuts using the **Pattern** lock screen, hold your position at the final dot in the pattern when unlocking the screen and the shortcuts will appear.

Owner info – Checkmark to set the device owner's name to be displayed on the Lock screen. Tap to enter the text to be displayed as the Owner info.

LOCK TIME

Lock timer – Allows you to set the amount of time before the screen automatically locks after the screen has timed-out.

Power button instantly locks -

Use the Application manager menu to view details about the applications installed on your phone, manage their data, and force them to stop. Select one of the four tabs across the top of the screen to view detailed information.

PERSONAL

The Personal section allow you to configure and manage your accounts.

Accounts & sync

Use the Accounts & sync menu to manage your Google™ and other supported accounts. You also use these settings to control data synchronization. You can set how and whether each application sends, receives, and syncata on their own schedules or whether user data is synchronized automatically.

Tap Accounts & sync to access the settings below. You can also use this menu to turn on the sync function (slide the switch to the right) or add a new account (tap ADD ACCOUNT at the bottom of the screen)

ACCOUNTS

Displays a list of all of your accounts, including your Google Account. Tap one of the entries to access their settings.

Location services

Spelling correction – Checkmark to allow spelling corrections. Tap to set the type of correction.

Personalized recognition – Improves speech recognition accuracy.

Google Account dashboard – Allows you to manage your collected data.

Text-to-speech output – Allows you to set the preferred speech engine and other general settings.

other settings.

Speech rate – Allows you to set the speed at which the text is spoken.

Listen to an example – Plays a short demonstration of speech synthesis.

This menu allows you to back up and erase your data.

Antenna Care

Persons with pacemakers:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON:
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, turn your phone OFF immediately.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult AT&T.

HAC

This phone has been tested and rated for use with hearing aids for some

of the wireless technologies that it uses. However, there may be some

newer wireless technologies used in this phone that have not been tested

yet for use with hearing aids. It is important to try the different features of

Turn your phone OFF when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, marked clearly. Potential areas may include: fueling areas (such as gasoline stations); below deck on boats; fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities; vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane); areas where the air contains chemicals or particles (such as grain, dust, or metal powders); and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

FDA Consumer Update

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration Center for Devices and Radiological Health Consumer Update on Mobile Phones.

1. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radiofrequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the Home screen. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in

reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results

2. What is the FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, the FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radiofrequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, the FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace, or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that

minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and

Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

The FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- ► National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

The FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States

must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. The FCC relies on the FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

The FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

3. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term 'wireless phone' refers here to handheld wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called 'cell', 'mobile', or 'PCS' phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radiofrequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by FCC safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of the FDA and other federal health and safety agencies.

When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called 'cordless phones,' which have a base unit connected to the telephone wirring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures far below the FCC safety limits.

4. What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radiofrequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer causing chemicals so as to be predisposed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000 Retween them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma. or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phone RF exposures. However none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

5. What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually

using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but 10 or more years follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancercausing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do- may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

6. What is the FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

The FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to

ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF). The FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on FMF issues. The FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. The FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts with independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research

needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

7. How can I find out how much radio frequency energy exposure I can get by using my wireless phone?

All phones sold in the United States must comply with Federal Communications Commission (FCC) guidelines that limit radio frequency energy (RF) exposures. The FCC established these guidelines in consultation with the FDA and the other federal health and safety agencies. The FCC limit for RF exposure from wireless telephones is set at a Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC limit is consistent with the safety standards developed by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineering (IEEE) and the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement. The exposure limit takes into consideration the body's ability to remove heat from the tissues that absorb energy from the wireless phone and is set well below levels known to have effects Manufacturers of wireless phones must report the RF exposure level for each model of phone to the FCC. The FCC website

(http://www.fcc.gov/oet/rfsafety) gives directions for locating the FCC identification number on your phone so you can find your phone's RF exposure level in the online listing.

8. What has the FDA done to measure the radio frequency energy coming from wireless phones?

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) is developing a technical standard for measuring the radio frequency energy (RF) exposure from wireless phones and other wireless handsets with the participation and leadership of FDA scientists and engineers. The standard, 'Recommended Practice for Determining the Spatial-Peak Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) in the Human Body Due to Wireless Communications Devices: Experimental Techniques,' sets forth the first consistent test methodology for measuring the rate at which RF is deposited in the heads of wireless phone users. The test method uses a tissuesimulating model of the human head. Standardized SAR test. methodology is expected to greatly improve the consistency of measurements made at

different laboratories on the same phone. SAR is the measurement of the amount of energy absorbed in tissue, either by the whole body or a small part of the body. It is measured in watts/kg (or milliwatts/g) or measurement. This measurement is used to determine whether a wireless phone complies with safety quidelines.

9. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radiofrequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure. If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your

body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna. Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

10. What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones. including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure. Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using

a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists

11. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, the FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by the FDA, medical device manufacturers. and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. The FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and

helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a 'compatible' phone and a 'compatible' hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000. The FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference. be found to occur the FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

10 Driver Safety Tips

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice almost anywhere, anytime. An important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When operating a car, driving is your first responsibility.

When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

1. Get to know your wireless phone and its features such as speed dial and redial. Carefully read your instruction manual and learn to take advantage of valuable features most phones offer, including automatic redial and memory. Also, work to memorize the phone keypad so you can use the speed dial function without taking your attention off the road.

- 2. When available, use a hands-free device. A number of hands-free wireless phone accessories are readily available today. Whether you choose an installed mounted device for your wireless phone or a speaker phone accessory, take advantage of these devices if available to you.
- 3. Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Make sure you place your wireless phone within easy reach and where you can reach it without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voicemail answer it for you.
- 4. Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow and ice can be hazardous, but so is heavy traffic. As a driver, your first responsibility is to pay attention to the road.
- 5. Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. If you are reading an Address Book or business card, or writing a "to-do" list while driving a car, you are not watching where you are going. It is common sense.

Don't get caught in a dangerous situation because you are reading or writing and not paying attention to the road or nearby vehicles.

- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan your calls before you begin your trip or attempt to coincide your calls with times you may be stopped at a stop sign, red light or otherwise stationary. But if you need to dial while driving, follow this simple tip— dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- 7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Stressful or emotional conversations and driving do not mix; they are distracting and even dangerous when you are behind the wheel of a car. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and if necessary, suspend conversations which have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- 8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Your wireless phone is one of the greatest tools you can own to protect yourself and your family in dangerous situations with your phone at your side, help is only three numbers away. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in

- the case of fire, traffic accident, road hazard or medical emergency. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
- 9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. Your wireless phone provides you a perfect opportunity to be a "Good Samaritan" in your community. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10. Call roadside assistance or a special wireless non-emergency assistance number when necessary. Certain situations you encounter while driving may require attention, but are not urgent enough to merit a call for emergency services. But you can still use your wireless phone to lend a hand. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured or a vehicle. You know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.

Consumer Information on SAR (Specific Absorption Rate)

This model phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6 W/kg.* Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands.

Although SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. Because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels to use only the power required to reach the network, in general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government-adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. The highest SAR value for this phone when tested for use at the ear is **0.29** W/kg and when worn on the body, as described in this user's manual, is

1.07 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phones models, depending upon available accessories and FCC requirements.) While there may be differences between SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure.

The FCC has granted an Equipment

Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines. SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section of http://www.fcc.gov/oet/fccid after searching on FCC ID **BEJP925**.

* In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

FCC Hearing-Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

On July 10, 2003, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Report and Order in WT Docket 01-309 modified the exception of wireless phones under the Hearing Aid Compatibility Act of 1988 (HAC Act) to require digital wireless phones be compatible with hearing-aids. The intent of the HAC Act is to ensure reasonable access to telecommunications services for persons with hearing disabilities.

While some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless phones, to assist hearing device users to find phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise. The hearing aid and wireless phone rating values are then added together. A sum of 5 is considered acceptable for normal use. A sum of 6 is considered for hest use





In the above example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless phone meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equal M5. This should provide the hearing aid user with "normal usage" while using their hearing aid with the particular wireless phone. "Normal usage" in this context is defined as a signal quality that's acceptable for normal operation.

The M mark is intended to be synonymous with the U mark. The T mark is intended to be synonymous with the UT mark. The M and T marks are recommended by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industries Solutions (ATIS). The U and UT marks are referenced in Section 20.19 of the FCC Rules. The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard.

When you're talking on a cell phone, it's recommended that you turn the BT (Bluetooth) mode off for HAC

According to HAC policy(KDB 285076), we state this handset has not been rated for hearing aid compatibility with respect to the WiFi capability.
