#### **Electrical Power Related Precautions**



#### WARNING

- Use only the power cord supplied with the unit or another manufacturer's authorized cord.
  - Failure to do so may result in fire or electrical shock or damage to the product.
- · Use only a properly grounded plug and receptacle.
  - If you do not you may be electrocuted or injured. Or the product might be damaged.
- · Do not use a damaged or loose plug.
- This may cause electrical shock or fire.
- · Operate the display only from a power source(i.e. voltage) indicated in the product specification.
  - Otherwise the product can be damaged, fire can occur or you may be electrocuted. If you are not sure what type of power supply you have, consult a certified electrician.
- In the presence of thunder and lightning, never touch the power cord and signal cable because it can be very dangerous.
  - It can cause electric shock.
- · Do not connect several extension cords, electrical appliances or electrical heaters to a single outlet. Use a power strip with a grounding terminal designed for exclusive use with the computer.
  - A fire can break out due to overheating.
- Do not touch the power plug with wet hands. Additionally, if the cord pin is wet or covered with dust, dry the power plug completely or wipe dust off before plugging in the cord.
  - You may be electrocuted due to excess moisture.

- If you don't intend to use the product for a long time, unplug the power cable from the product.
  - Layers of dust can cause a fire, or insulation deterioration can cause electric leakage, electric shock or fire.

## **Precautions for installing the Product**

## **WARNING**

- · Keep away from heat sources like heaters or open flames.
  - Electrical shock, fire, malfunction or deformation may occur.
- Keep the packing anti-moisture material or vinyl packing out of the reach of children.
  - Anti-moisture material is harmful if swallowed. If swallowed by mistake, force the patient to vomit and visit the nearest hospital. Additionally, vinyl packing can cause suffocation. Keep it out of the reach of children.
- · Do not put heavy objects on the product or sit upon it.
  - If the product collapses or is dropped, you may be injured. Prevent Children from climbing or pulling on the unit.
- Do not leave the power or signal cable where someone can trip over it.
  - Pedestrians may become entangled in the cables and cause the device to become damaged causing electrical shock, fire, or serious injury.
- Install the product in a neat and dry place. Do not use near water.
  - Dust or moisture can cause electrical shock, fire or product damage.
- · Do not add accessories that have not been designed for this display.
- If you smell smoke or other odors or hear a strange sound from the product unplug the power cord and contact LG Customer Service.


#### **MARNING**

- · Make sure to turn off the product.

- · Make sure to remove all cables before moving the product.
  - You may be electrocuted or the product can be damaged.
- When lifting or moving the product, do not hold it upside down while holding only the stand.
  - This may cause the product to fall resulting in damage or injury.
- · Do not shock the product when moving it.
  - You may be electrocuted or the product can be damaged.
- · Make sure the panel faces forward and hold it with both hands to move.
  - If you drop the product, the damaged product can cause electric shock or fire.

## **Precautions for Using/Cleaning the Product**

## **WARNING**

- · Do not attempt to disassemble, repair or modify the product yourself.

- Keep the product away from water.
  - Fire or electric shock accident can occur.
- · Avoid high temperatures and humidity.
- Do not put or store flammable substances near the product.
  - There is a danger of explosion or fire.
- · Keep the product clean at all times.
- · Take a comfortable and natural position when working with the product.
- · Take a regular break when working with the product for a long time.
- · Do not press on the panel with a hand or sharp object such as nail, pencil or pen, or make a scratch on it.




## **Connecting the Speakers**



3 Then connect the speaker cable. After installing your speakers, use the cable holders and cable ties to arrange the speaker cables.






 Please turn off the power before removing the cable. Connecting or removing the speaker cable while turned on may result in no sound.

## **IR & Light Sensor Connection**

When the cable is connected to the product, the feature for receiving remote control signals is activated. The IR & Light sensor is magnetic. Attach it to the corner of the front side of the product for use.





• The signal strength of the IR & Light sensor will decrease if it is not attached to the front of the product.

## **Portrait Layout**

When installing in a portrait layout, rotate the monitor counterclockwise 90 degrees (when facing the screen).



#### **Using Kensington Lock**

(This is not available for all models.)

Connect the Kensington security system cable between the monitor and a table.







## Attaching and removing the LG Logo Bracket



#### Removing the LG Logo Bracket

1 Lay a clean cloth on the floor, and then put the monitor on it with the screen face down. Remove the two screws that secure the LG Logo Bracket to the bottom of the rear side of the monitor using a screwdriver.




2 After removing the screws, remove the LG Logo Bracket. When re-attaching the LG Logo Bracket, repeat the process in reverse order.




#### Attaching the LG Logo Bracket on the right side

1 Lay a clean cloth on the floor, and then put the monitor on it with the screen face down. Remove the two screws that secure the LG Logo Bracket to the bottom of the rear side of the monitor using a screwdriver.




2 After removing the screws, remove the LG Logo Bracket. Align the LG Logo Bracket with the holes on the right side and then attach it using the two screws.




## Installing on a Wall

For proper ventilation, allow a clearance of 100 mm on each side and from the wall. Detailed installation instructions are available from your dealer, see the optional Tilt Wall Mounting Bracket Installation and Setup Guide.



To install your monitor on a wall, attach a wall mounting bracket (optional part) to the back of the monitor. Make sure that the wall mounting bracket is securely fixed to the monitor and to the wall.

- 1 Use only screws and wall mounting brackets that conform to VESA standards.
- 2 Screws which are longer than standard length may damage the inside of the monitor.
- 3 A non-VESA standard screw may damage the product and cause the monitor to fall. LG Electronics is not liable for any accidents related to the use of non-standard screws.
- 4 Please use VESA standard as below.
- 785 mm (30.9 inches) and above
  - \* Fixing screws: Diameter 6.0 mm x Pitch 1.0 mm x Length 12 mm (Diameter 0.2 inches x Pitch 0.03 inches x Length 0.4 inches)


- · Disconnect the power cord before moving or installing the monitor to avoid risk of electric shock.
- If you install the monitor on a ceiling or slanted wall, it may fall and result in injury. Use an authorized LG wall mount and contact your local dealer or qualified personnel to assist with the installation.
- Do not over tighten the screws as this may damage the monitor and void your warranty.
- Use only screws and wall mounting brackets that meet the VESA standard. Any damage or injuries caused by misuse
  or use of improper accessories are not covered by the warranty.



- The wall mount kit includes the installation guide and all necessary parts.
- · The wall mounting bracket is optional. You can obtain additional accessories from your local dealer.
- · The length of screws required may differ depending on the wall mount. Be sure to use the correct length.

#### Securing the monitor to a wall (optional)

(Procedure may differ depending on the model.)



- 1 Insert and tighten the eyebolts, or brackets and bolts on the back of the monitor.
  - If there are already bolts inserted in the eyebolts' position, remove the other bolts first.
- 2 Mount the wall brackets with the bolts to the wall. Match the location of the wall bracket and the eyebolts on the rear of the monitor.
- 3 Connect the eyebolts and wall brackets tightly with a sturdy cord. Make sure the securing cord is horizontal with the flat surface.

#### WARNING

- · If the monitor is not positioned in a sufficiently stable location, there is a danger that it will fall. Many injuries, particularly to children, can be avoided by taking simple precautions such as:
  - Using cabinets or stands recommended by the manufacturer.
  - Only using furniture that can safely support the monitor.
  - Ensuring the monitor is not overhanging the edge of the supporting furniture.
  - Not placing the monitor on tall furniture (for example, cupboards or bookcases) without anchoring both the furniture and the monitor to a suitable support.



## REMOTE CONTROL

To remove the batteries, perform the installation actions in reverse. The illustrations may differ from the actual accessories.








**PICTURE ID ON/OFF** When the Picture ID number matches the Set ID number, you can control whichever monitor you want in multi-display format.

**USB Menu Control Buttons** Controls media playback.

You can connect various external devices to your monitor. Change the input mode and select the external device you want to connect. For more information about external device connections, see the user manual provided with each device.

## Connecting to a PC

Some of the cables are not provided.

This monitor supports the Plug and Play\* feature.

\* Plug and Play: a feature that enables a PC to recognize devices attached by the user without device configuration or user intervention when powering up.

#### **External Device Connection**

monitor using HDMI cables is recommended.

Connect a HD receiver, DVD, or VCR player to the monitor and select an appropriate input mode. Some of the cables are not provided. For the best picture and sound quality, connecting external devices to your

#### NOTE

- · For the best image quality, using the monitor with HDMI connection is recommended.
- To comply with the specifications of the product, use a shielded interface cable with ferrite core, such as a D-sub 15pin cable and DVI-D/HDMI cable.
- If you turn the monitor on when the set is cold, the screen may flicker. This is normal.
- · Sometimes red, green, or blue spots may appear on the screen. This is normal.
- Use a High Speed HDMI<sup>®</sup>/<sup>TM</sup> cable.
- Use a certified cable with the HDMI logo attached. If you do not use a certified HDMI cable, the screen may not display or a connection error may occur.
- Recommended HDMI Cable Types
  - High Speed HDMI®/TM Cable
  - High Speed HDMI®/TM Cable with Ethernet
- If you cannot hear any sound in HDMI mode please check your PC settings. Some PCs require you to manually change the default audio output to HDMI.
- If you want to use HDMI-PC mode, you must set your PC/DTV to PC mode.
- · You may experience compatibility issues if you use HDMI-PC mode.
- · Make sure the power cable is disconnected.
- If you connect a gaming device to the monitor, use the cable provided with the gaming device.
- It is recommended to use the speakers that are provided as optional accessories.
- High Speed HDMI<sup>®</sup>/<sup>TM</sup> cables transmit a HD signal up to 1080p and higher.


### **CAUTION**

- · Connect the signal input cable and tighten it by turning the screws clockwise.
- Do not press the screen with your finger for a prolonged period as this may result in temporary distortion on the screen.
- Avoid displaying static images on the screen for a long period of time to prevent image burn. Use a screensaver if
  possible.
- A wireless communication device near your monitor can affect the image.

## **Daisy Chain Monitors**

To use different products connected to each other, connect one end of the signal input cable (DP Cable) to the DP Out connector of Monitor 1 and connect the other end to the DP In connector of the other product.

\* DP Cable - Use a DP cable that is certified to DP1.1a (SST), DP1.2 (MST) or higher.



#### NOTE

- If the signal is stable and there is no cable loss, in general, up to 100 monitors can be connected via the DP Out port (at the recommended resolution). If you want to connect more than this number of monitors, use a booster.
- · If you set the tile mode using DVI-D or HDMI, you will not be able to watch HDCP-encrypted content.
- If the signal cable between the product and your PC is too long, make sure to use the Booster or optical cable.

# **TROUBLESHOOTING**

#### No image is displayed.

Action
Check if the power cord is correctly plugged into the power outlet.
<ul> <li>The signal from the PC (Graphics card) is out of the vertical or horizontal frequency range of the product. Adjust the frequency range by referring to the Specifications in this manual.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>The signal cable between PC and product is not connected. Check the signal cable.</li> <li>Press the INPUT menu in the remote control to check the input signal.</li> </ul>

#### The Unknown Product message appears when the product is connected.

Problem	Action
Did you install the driver?	Check if the Plug and Play function is supported by referring to the
	graphics card user manual.

#### The screen image looks abnormal.

Problem	Action
Is the screen position wrong?	<ul> <li>Check if the graphics card resolution and frequency are supported by the product. If the frequency is out of range, set to the recommended resolution in the [Control Panel] → [Display] → [Setting] menu.</li> <li>(The settings may differ depending on your operating system.)</li> </ul>
The screen is displayed abnormally.	The proper input signal is not connected to the signal port. Connect the signal cable that matches with the source input signal.

#### After-image appears on the product.

Problem	Action
After-image appears when the product is turned off.	If you use a fixed image for a long time, the pixels may be damaged.  Use the screen-saver function.
	When a dark image is displayed on the screen after an image with high contrast (black and white or gray), this may cause image sticking. This is normal for LCD screen products.

#### The audio function does not work.

Problem	Action
No sound?	See if the audio cable is connected properly.
	Adjust the volume.

Sound is too dull.	Select the appropriate equalizer sound.

#### Screen color is abnormal.


Image sticking does not occur when using constantly changing images but may occur when using a fixed image for an
extended period of time. Therefore, it is recommended that you use the instructions below to decrease the likelihood
of image sticking occurring when using a fixed image. It is recommended that you change the screen at least once

When changing colors, using complementary colors helps to prevent image sticking.

Make sure that the characters or images before changing the image remain in the same location after changing the image.

#### What is image sticking?

When the LCD panel displays a static image for an extended period of time, it can cause a voltage difference between the electrodes that operate the liquid crystals. When the voltage difference between the electrodes builds up over time, liquid crystals have a tendency to remain aligned in one direction. During this process, a previously displayed image remains visible. This phenomenon is referred to as image sticking.

#### Picture Settings

#### To Select Picture Mode

Select the picture mode that is best suited to the video type.

- · [Vivid]: Adjusts the video image for a retail environment by enhancing the Contrast, Brightness, and Sharpness.
- [Standard]: Adjusts the video image for a normal environment.
- [APS]: APS (Auto power saving) mode reduces power consumption by dimming control.
- · [Cinema]: Optimizes the video image for watching movies.
- [Sports]: Optimizes the video image for watching sports. Even fast actions such as kicking or throwing a ball are rendered clearly on the screen.
- · [Game]: Optimizes the video image for playing videogames.
- [Photo]: Optimizes the screen for viewing photos. (This feature is available only with certain models.)
- [Expert]/[Calibration]: Allows an expert, or anyone interested in high quality pictures, to manually tune the picture for the best picture quality.

# **NOTE**

• When entering [Multi-screen], the screen may flicker and the picture may appear abnormal on certain devices while the optimal resolution is selected automatically. If this happens, please restart the monitor.

#### Selecting Screen Layout

When you enter [Multi-screen] without having set any screen layout, the screen layout selection menu appears.

If the screen layout menu does not appear, you can press the up arrow key on the remote control to go to the screen layout menu bar and select it to show the screen layout menu.

#### Closing Screen Layout Menu

From the screen layout menu, press the up arrow key on the remote control to go to the screen layout menu bar and select it or press the 'BACK' key to close the screen layout menu.

#### **Changing Screen Input**

Press the \_ button on the top right of each split screen to select the desired input.

- · Inputs which have already been selected for other split screens cannot be selected again. To select them, press the 'RESET' button to reset the inputs for all screens first.



# **PICTURE ID Settings**

- Only applies to certain models. [PICTURE ID] is used to change the settings of a specific set (display) using a single IR receiver for multivision. Communication is possible between a monitor with an IR receiver and other monitors using RS-232C cables. Each monitor is identified by a Set ID. If you assign the [PICTURE ID] using the remote control, only displays with matching PICTURE ID and Set ID can be controlled remotely.
- Assign the Set ID to the installed monitors as shown below.



- 2 Press the red ON button on the remote control to assign the PICTURE ID.
- 3 Assign the Set ID to the selection of your choice.
- A set with a different Set ID from the PICTURE ID cannot be controlled by IR signals.







- LAN Daisy Chain forms a daisy chain of LAN ports so that even if you connect only one monitor set to a network, the other sets in the daisy are connected to the network.
- The first set in the daisy chain must be connected to a network through a port that is not being used for the daisy chain.

# **Power Off Management**

- · No Signal Power Off (15 Min)
  - You can choose whether to use the 15 min force off feature.
  - You can set this option to On or Off.
  - If you set this option to On, the product turns off when it has remained in no signal status for 15 minutes.
  - If you set this option to Off, the 15 min force off feature is disabled.
  - Set this option to Off when you use the product for a long period of time.
- · Auto Power Off
  - You can choose whether to use the 4 hours off feature.
  - You can set this option to 4 Hours or Off.
  - If you set this option to 4 Hours, the product turns off when you have not pressed any buttons on the remote control for 4 hours.
  - If you set this option to Off, the 4 hours off feature becomes disabled.
  - Set this option to Off when you use the product for a long period of time.

#### DPM

- You can configure the DPM (Display Power Management) function.
- Off: you can set this option to Off, 5 sec./10 sec./15 sec./1 min./3 min./5 min./10 min. (The settings may vary depending on the model.)
- If this option is not set to Off, the monitor set enters the DPM mode when there is no input signal.
- If you set this option to Off, the DPM function is disabled.
- In the cases below, 5 sec. and 10 sec. options will be disabled for DPM. If DPM is already set to 5 sec. or 10 sec., it will be changed to 15 sec.
  - 1. When USB Auto Playback is set to Photo or Movie (OLED models support the Movie option only.)
  - 2. When Fail Over is set to Auto or Manual
- If you set this option to 10 sec. or less, the monitor set enters the DPM mode before automatic play of SuperSign contents.
- · DPM Wake up Control
  - Turns on the monitor set according to the digital signal processing of the connected DVI-D/HDMI port.
  - Setting this option to Clock only checks for the signals from the digital clock. If there is a clock signal, the monitor set is turned on.
  - Setting this option to Clock+DATA turns on the monitor set only when there are both digital clock signal and data signal inputs.

- PM Mode
  - Power Off: Normal DC off status.
  - Sustain Aspect Ratio: Normal DC off status except that Switching IC stays on. On certain models, this applies only to a specific input mode (DisplayPort) and has the same effect as Screen Off Always in other input modes.
  - Screen Off: Automatically changes to Screen Off status when entering the DPM mode, Auto Off (15 mins, 4 hours), or Abnormal Shut Down.
  - Screen Off Always: Automatically changes to Screen Off status when entering the DPM mode, Auto Off (15 mins, 4 hours), Off Timer, Abnormal Shut Down, or when there is input from the remote control's Power button or the monitor's Off button.
  - To change the screen from Off to On status, there must be input from the remote control's Power or Input button, or the monitor's On button.
  - Screen Off & Backlight (Outdoor Mode): This feature allows the enclosure to function normally in temperatures below zero.



- · Set to Screen Off & Backlight (Outdoor Mode) when installing outdoors.
- · When the Outdoor mode is set, you can reduce the cause for internal humidity and condensation in the product.
- When operating in low temperatures, the enclosure may not work for up to one hour to raise the internal temperature of the enclosure.
- · For compatibility of some media input devices, set the Sustain Aspect Ratio.

#### Rotation

- OSD Portrait Mode
  - This feature allows you to rotate the OSD clockwise.
  - You can set this feature to Off/90/180/270. (Some models only support certain settings.)
  - If you set this feature to Off, the feature is disabled.

  - As for ARC, setting Content Rotation to On (90 or 270) adjusts the size of a video to the full screen size.
  - With WiDi, it is recommended that you set Aspect Ratio to Original if you intend to use Content Rotation. If you set Aspect Ratio to Full, the displayed position of the mouse pointer may not be accurate.
  - Image quality degradation is not a product issue when setting Content Rotation using external input.
  - Setting Content Rotation to On disables the Multi-screen PIP mode.
  - If Content Rotation is set to On (90 or 270 degrees), some widgets and SWF files may not appear properly.
  - If External Input Rotation is enabled on models that support touch, touch may not work properly.

- · Beacon Mode (on/off toggle): Enables the Beacon feature.
- · Supports LG Beacon/iBeacon/Eddystone Type Beacon features.
- I G Beacon/iBeacon
  - Beacon UUID (hex): Sets the UUID.
    - 1. Field1: 4byte hex value (8 digits)
    - 2. Field2: 2byte hex value (4 digits)
    - 3. Field3: 2byte hex value (4 digits)
    - 4. Field4: 2byte hex value (4 digits)
    - 5. Field5: 6byte hex value (12 digits)
  - Major (0-65535): Sets the Major value.
  - Minor (0-65535): Sets the Minor value.
- Eddystone
- Frame: Sets UUID or URL.
  - 1. Beacon UUID (hex): Sets the UUID.
  - (1) Field1: 10byte hex value (20 digits)
  - (2) Field2: 6byte hex value (12 digits)
  - 2. Setting the URL
  - URL Prefix: Sets the prefix of the URL.
  - URL Suffix: Sets the suffix of the URL.
  - URL: Enter the part of the URL that excludes the prefix and suffix.
  - URL string length is limited to 17 characters.
- · OK: Confirm button that applies the settings that you have entered.
- Some models do not support background scanning services in iOS.
- · A reboot is recommended for the settings to be applied properly.
- The UUID value is hexadecimal and the exact number of digits must be entered.

### Baudrate (9600/115200)

- You can change the RS-232C communication speed for controlling your monitor.
- You can choose 9600 or 115200.
- If you set this option to 9600, the RS-232C communication speed is set at 9600 bps.
- If you set this option to 115200, the RS-232C communication speed is set at 115200 bps.

# Power On Delay (0 ~ 250)

- · This feature delays power on in order to prevent overload when multiple monitor sets are turned on simultaneously.
- · You can set the delay interval in the range of 0 to 250 seconds.

#### **Check Screen**

- The Check Screen feature judges whether there are abnormalities at the edges of the screen. R, G, and B OSDs are formed on the screen at one second intervals and an Pixel Sensor tests the areas.
- · If set to On, the Check Screen feature is enabled.
- · If set to Off, the Check Screen feature is disabled.
- When OSD Portrait Mode is applied, Check Screen is turned off and deactivated.

#### **OPS Power Control**

- · You can control the power of the OPS.
- · Disable: Disables the OPS Power Control.
- Sync (on): Synchronizes the power status of the monitor and the OPS only when monitor is on.
- · Sync (on/off): Always synchronizes the power status of the monitor and the OPS.
- · When you set the OPS Power Control feature to on, you must set the sustain Aspect Ratio of the PM Mode to off.

# Multi Display Mode

- The Multi Display Mode function displays a video signal received from DP In either in single mode (SST: Single Stream Transport) or multi-mode (MST: Multi Stream Transport) through DP Out.
- If it is On, the image of each display is displayed in multi-mode.
- · If it is Off, the image of each display is displayed in single mode.
- The multi-mode is available in a PC supporting DisplayPort 1.2.
- Multi-mode can connect up to only four monitors. (at the recommended resolution.)
- When this function is used, your monitor may not work properly depending on the video card. Reboot the PC after setting the function to Off for stable screen output when not in use.
- In case of using DVI/HDMI Input to DP Daisy Chain, please set 'Multi Display mode function' to off.

#### Power Indicator

- · Changes Power Indicator settings.
- · If set to On, the Power Indicator is turned on.
- · If set to Off, the Power Indicator is turned off.
- While the product is turned on, the Power Indicator is lit for about 15 seconds regardless of whether it is set to On or Off.

### Sync Mode

- Syncs the products to the time, brightness and content of one product.
- · Off: Sync is disabled.
- RS-232C: Syncs multiple monitors connected via RS-232C.
  - Master/Slave: These monitors can be set to Master or Slave. Only one monitor should be set to Master mode for this feature to work properly.
  - Time Sync: When Time Sync is set to On, the current time of the Master monitor is sent to multiple Slave monitors connected via RS-232C to sync the time. The monitors are synced every hour after the initial sync when Time Sync was set to On. (If any change occurs, there is an initial sync, and then the sync continues every hour.)

  - Select the file name: Up to 10 files can be selected from the List of files in the selected device. Selecting the files will activate the SYNC NOW button at the top and make the next step available.
  - Only MP4 files are supported, and all files must be located in the SyncPlay folder in the root directory of the device.
  - Before using Network Sync, set the proxy server settings to Off.
- UPnP: Opens or blocks UDP port 1900, which is used for UPnP.
  - The default is On. Setting this to Off blocks UDP port 1900, making the UPnP function unavailable.
  - If this is set to Off, the 'Network' item of Sync Mode becomes inactive.
  - If this is set to Off and Sync Mode was set to 'Network', Sync Mode is switched to 'Off' and the 'Network' item becomes inactive.
  - If the UPnP value is changed, the function is not applied without a reboot.

### Intelligent Auto

Adjusts the size, position, and phase of the monitor's screen automatically at the recognized resolution. This feature
is available only in RGB input mode.

#### Studio Mode

- · Outputs the images with a lower color temperature.
- · You can set this feature to On or Off.
- · Setting this feature to On lowers the color temperature of the images.

#### **HDMI IT Contents**

- Sets the HDMLIT Contents function.
- · Disable: Does not use the HDMI IT Contents function.
- Enable: Uses the HDMI IT Contents function.
- This function automatically changes the Picture mode based on HDMI Contents information when an HDMI signal is entered.
- · Even if the HDMI IT Contents function has changed the Picture mode, you can change the Picture mode manually.
- As this has a higher priority than the Picture mode set by the user, the existing Picture mode may change when the HDMI signal is changed.

#### White Balance

- · Adjusts the R-Gain, G-Gain, B-Gain, and Backlight values.
- · Reset: Resets the White Balance value.
- White Pattern: Displays a White Pattern across the entire screen. (80IRE / 100IRE)

### **Application**

- · Adds/deletes applications in the Launcher bar.
- We recommend that if you are to remove the Screen Share app from the home launcher by unchecking the Screen Share item, you should reboot your system after removal.
- When Content Rotation or OSD Portrait Mode is set to On, the 'Group Manager' app is removed from the launcher and the 'Group Manager' item is deactivated.
- · When the Control Manager is set to On, the Control Manager app will be added to the Launcher bar.
- When the Leveler Tool is set to On, the Leveler Tool app will be added to the Launcher bar.
- If SuperSign Contents is set to On, the "SuperSign Contents" app is added to the Launcher Bar.
- If the SI Server is set to On, the "SI Server" app is added to the Launder Bar.

#### Web Browser

- Launches the Chromium browser app and supports simple browsing.
- The browser can perform basic tests for HTML-based apps and has the following properties:
  - Supports basic web page browsing.
  - Does not support additional features that aid the proper display of specific sites (UA Spoofing per site, etc.).
- The browser has the following constraints:
  - Supports mouse and remote control 5-key browsing, but does not support touchpad browsing.
  - Does not support PIP.
  - Does not guarantee the reliability of HTML content outside of the SI app (YouTube, etc.) as it is to be used for test purposes.

### Status Message

- Sets up a feature that sends the status of Signage to users' email addresses.
- · The administrator can set Status Message to On or Off.
- · Messaging Period: Sets a time interval to send messages. You can select either When Failure Status or Weekly.
- Select Date: Available if you have set Messaging Period to Weekly. Select your desired day of the week for message transmission.
- · Select Time: Available if you have set Messaging Period to Weekly. Select your desired time for message transmission.
- · User E-mail Address: Enter the sender's email address.
- · Type: Fixed as POP3.
- Sending Server (SMTP): Enter the POP3 outgoing mail server address and port number.
- ID: Enter the mail server's user ID.
- Password: Enter the mail server's user password.
- Receiver E-Mail Address: Enter the recipient's email address for status messages.
- · If the status regarding any of the following items changes or becomes abnormal, a status message can be sent.
  - 1. Temperature: If the monitor set reaches a dangerous temperature, its current temperature is recorded, and an email containing such information is sent.
  - 2. Validity of the temperature sensor. An email is sent if there is no temperature sensor connected, if the communication status of the temperature sensor is unknown, or if the information provided by the chip provider is abnormal.
  - 3. Network Status (Wireless/Wired): An email is sent when the network's connection status is changed. The

### SIMPLINK Setup







The screen moves in the order of left, right, up, and down, and in this case, a part of the outer parts of the screen may be hidden. (When the input is No Signal, it will be inactivated.)



### Repeat

- Off, just 1 time: If you select the desired mode and press DONE, ISM operates immediately.

### Repeat Day

- · You can set the date.
- · This option is available only when Repeat is set to Scheduling.

#### **Start Time**

- · Set the Start time.
- · This option is available only when Repeat is set to Scheduling.
- · You cannot set the same time for Start time and End time.

#### **End Time**

- · Set the End time.
- · This option is available only when Repeat is set to Scheduling.
- · You cannot set the same time for Start time and End time.

### **Action Cycle**

- You can select from among 1-10 mins/20 mins/30 mins/60 mins/90 mins/120 mins/180 mins/240 mins.
- · This option is available only when you have selected Inversion or Orbiter.
- · Orbiter. Moves the position of the screen at specified intervals.
- · Inversion: Inverts the screen color at specified intervals.

### Bar Image

- Off: Displays a bar with a fixed resolution of 300 x 1080, then moves the bar.
- On: Displays and moves an image downloaded by the user. The image is displayed with a fixed height of 1080 and the same width as downloaded. However, if the width of the image is below 300, it will have a fixed value of 300.
- This option is available only when you have selected Washing Bar.
- If you have downloaded only one image, the bar is moved and the image is displayed alone.

#### **Bar Color**

- · Left To Right: The bar is moved from left to right.
- · Right To Left: The bar is moved from right to left.
- This option is available only when you have selected Washing Bar.

## User Image Download

- · This option is available only when you have selected User Image.

#### User Video Download

- To download a video, the video file must be located under the folder titled "ISM" on your USB drive.
- Make sure to delete the old contents stored in the internal memory before downloading a new video file.
- Supported video file types: "MP4", "AVI", "FLV", "MKV", "MPEG", "TS"
- · You can download up to one video.
- If there are no videos, or if the existing videos have been deleted, the default video is used. (The default video is a
  white background image.)
- This option is available only when you have selected User Video.
- · Audio is not supported.

# \* How to reset or delete downloaded bar images/user images/user videos

- To reset, go to Installation > Signage Setup > Factory Reset.
- · To delete, go to Internal Memory under My Media's Devices item and delete the desired downloaded content.

# Server

### Set Automatically

• The monitor settings will be set automatically so that the SuperSign server can search it.

### Server IP Type

· Select the IPv4 or the IPv6 type.

### Server IP

· This is a menu where you can set an IP address for the SuperSign server.

#### Server Status

- Server Status displays the status of the connection between your monitor and the SuperSign server.
- Not Connected indicates that your monitor is not connected to the SuperSign server.
- · Waiting for Approval indicates that your monitor is connected to the SuperSign server but not yet approved.
- Rejected indicates that your monitor is connected to the SuperSign server but has been rejected.
- · Connected indicates that your monitor is connected to the SuperSign server and has been approved.

#### Port Number

• Sets the SuperSign server's port. (Supported on SuperSign Premium 1.0 or later)

#### Secured Connection

 You can choose whether to use security protocols when connecting to the SuperSign server. (Supported on SuperSign Premium 1.0 or later)

# Control Server IP Type

· Select the IPv4 or the IPv6 type.

#### Control Server IP

• This menu is to set the IP of the SuperSign Control Server.

### **Control Server Port**

• This menu is to set the port of the SuperSign Control Server.

#### Control Server Status

- This displays the status of connection with the SuperSign Control Server.
- · Not Connected: When not connected to the SuperSign Control Server
- · Waiting for Approval: When connected to the SuperSign Control Server but not approved
- · Connected: When connected to the SuperSign Control Server and approved

# **Lock Mode**

### **USB**

· You can prevent the use of USB devices.

#### OSD

· You can prevent OSD from displaying.

#### Wi-Fi

· This feature enables you to turn the Wi-Fi feature on or off.

# Reset to Initial Settings

· You can restore the initial settings with this feature.

## IR Operation

- · If you set IR Operation to Normal, you can use the remote control.
- If you set IR Operation to Power Key Only, you can only use the Power Key.
- If you set IR Operation to Block All, you cannot use the remote control. (Power On feature is available.)

# **Local Key Operation**

- If you set Local Key Operation to Normal, you can use the Local Key.
- If 'Local Key Operation' is set to Power Key Only, only the Power Key can be used. (The joystick will function as the Power Key if you press and hold the Local Key.)
- If you set Local Key Operation to Block All, you cannot use the Local Key. (Power On feature is available.)
